

BEATTY BACK FROM BRITAIN LAUDS CANADA

Sees Opportunity for Development of Closer Relations With Motherland

QUEBEC, July 4.—"When I go abroad I always return with the feeling that this country is one of the best in the world to live in, and that its resources must become more and more recognized as making it potentially one of the wealthiest parts of the British Empire," said E. W. Beatty, chairman and president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, on his arrival here Saturday from a five week's visit to England.

Mr. Beatty arrived on board the Empress of France and was interviewed here as the steamer docked. "My trip," he said, "was a hurried one and my time entirely taken up with the business which necessitated it, consequently any observations on the continent or in Great Britain would only be the views of others with whom I discussed the general situation and, in a large measure, confirmatory of the press dispatches which have already reached Canada."

CAN MAGNIFY CANADA.

"While I do not say it in any critical spirit, I left England with the conviction that we could do a great deal more there than has been done to bring to the attention of the Motherland the really great opportunities and imperial importance of our own country, both from the standpoint of inducing more British capital, support to Canadian enterprise and development and of the preliminary training of agriculturists in Great Britain. This plan is fundamentally sound and capable of immense development. Two farms have been established where six months' training in the rudiments of agriculture is given to young men between the ages of 18 and 25. The principle is right, because the experience of training permits the elimination of those who are physically or otherwise unfit, gives a knowledge of the rudiments of agricultural work and prepares the prospective settler mentally for the conditions he will have to meet.

In conclusion Mr. Beatty expressed his pleasure at returning to Canada. "I am a Canadian," he declared, "and I am not naturally prejudiced in favor of my own country. It would be very difficult to over-estimate the value of its development in imperial solidarity and unity."

Mr. Beatty was accompanied by W. MacInnes, vice-president in charge of traffic, and F. E. Meredith, K.C., director of the Canadian Pacific Steamships, Limited.

DOUBTS SEPT. 21 AS DATE OF ELECTION

Saint John M. P. Says Progressives Precipitated Dissolution of Parliament

Stating that the dissolution of parliament was precipitated by the Progressives and that it had come as a bolt from the blue, Thomas Bell, M. P. for Saint John-Albert, arrived in the city from Ottawa yesterday afternoon. Mr. Bell said that none of the members had any idea that dissolution was so imminent.

"Rev. T. W. Bird, of Nelson, the Progressive member who rose in his seat and announced that he had voted against the government inadvertently, having been paired and desired to have his vote stricken out, is the most detested man in the country today," charged Mr. Bell. "He has been a member of parliament for almost five years and his action could not be said to be that of one unacquainted with the rules of the House," Mr. Bell declared.

"I have grave doubts as to Sept. 21 being the date of election," replied Mr. Bell when asked whether there was any official word in this being the date set for an appeal to the country. "Naturally, the election would be held as soon and at as convenient a time as possible. I do not think that would be a convenient date. The western farmers would not have finished reaping by that time. When the ministers are chosen and the cabinet formed, the latter will decide upon a propitious date."
