BRITAIN CHARGED

London, Aug. 28.—British papers are printing almost daily examples of what they term the waste of public funds. A report just issued by the Committee of Public Accounts sheds fresh light on the subject. Nearly \$8,500,000 was involved, it appears, in the government's plan to finance the Russian General Alexieff just before the Bolshevik revolution brought about his collapse. Part of the plan was to set up a Cossack State Bank in Siberia, and for that purpose \$2,500,000 as loaned to a Russian financier. But the bank was never set up and the committee wants to know what became of the money.
