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THE HARD COAL OPERATORS DEFEND PRICE

Present Figures to Refute
Miners' Figures—Railroad
Strike Has Some Effect.

New York, April 13.—Anthracite mine operators, in defending their system of profits, yesterday presented several volumes of data to refute figures submitted by the mine workers purporting to show that their wages were not responsible for the high price of coal to the public.

The operators denied they were making unjustified profits and questioned the accuracy of the miners' figures.

The data of the mine workers was introduced by the operators which they said completely refuted the workers' declarations and figures. Both sides participated in vigorous arguments.

Reports received here by union officials yesterday stated that approximately forty per cent of the anthracite mines in the Pennsylvania region had been closed by the railroad strike.

John I. Lewis, international president of the mine workers, however, expressed confidence that the present labor unrest would not be communicated to the workers in the hard coal fields.

The miners' head said every effort was being made to speed up the negotiations and reach an agreement in order to prevent a possible "rise of discontent" in the anthracite region.

LOCAL NEWS

CHICAGO CAMEL PARADE.

New Thirty Order Already Has Big Membership.

Chicago, April 13.—The first invasion of Chicago by the Order of Camels, a new anti-prohibition organization, which is gaining hundreds of recruits in the middle west daily, was greeted with considerable enthusiasm in the business section here. The camels were immediately accepted by the Chicago public as an excellent mascot for the new order, whose aim is the annulment of the prohibition law and to restore the use of beer and light wine.

Crowds lined the sidewalks and craned from office windows to see the parade pass.

Hand-clapping, whistles and scattered cheers, not unmingled with rueful smiles and heavy sighs, marked the progress of the anti-prohibition caravan. The purpose of the demonstration was to launch a campaign for more members and the formation of new "caravans."

The camels expect to receive 100,000 members in Chicago. They will oppose the Eighteenth amendment and the act of the Anti-Cigarette movement and the Sunday closing of theatres and ball parks.

WANT 40-HOUR WEEK.

Sydney, N. S. W., April 13.—Australian labor demands a forty-hour week with a Saturday rest day. In New South Wales, however, the painters demand a forty-hour week. The men refuse to arbitrate, and say they will simply take holidays and Saturdays. The employers threaten legal action.

London, Eng., April 13.—The British Priesian cow, Stanfield Dorrit, belonging to John Broomet, has given in a year 2,268½ gallons of milk and 1,018 pounds of butter fat, equal to 1,192 pounds of commercial butter.

The peaceful serenity of last Sunday morning at Drury Cove was rudely disturbed by a number of presumably city residents, who arrived in two automobiles, prepared to enjoy a clay pigeon shooting party. It is understood if the shooting is repeated the action of the authorities will be requested to put a stop to it.

FAIRVILLE A. O. H.



MORNING NEWS

OVER THE WIRES

It is said that the soldier, Frank Hall, who recently arrived in this city on route to Ontario, and who was supposed to have suffered a lapse of memory, was identified yesterday by James C. Mitchell of Toronto, inspector of immigration, as Clyde Danaham, who was deported to England in June, 1918, after having served ten months of a twenty-four months sentence in the provincial prison. He was taken into custody to be deported for deportation to England. He is said to be a native of England.

The soldiers' settlement board of Canada has completed arrangements with the three prairie provinces for land settlement by returned soldiers.

In the case of the King vs. Nick Debea and George Morhart, charged with the murder of Tote Kostulin at Kamagant, Quebec, the jury yesterday returned a verdict of guilty and Justice Pelletier sentenced the two to be hanged on the morning of June 25.

The Estrada Cabrera government in Guatemala has been overthrown according to advices received and the revolutionists have formed a new government.

South Bend, Ind., April 13.—Three hold-up men robbed the South Bend State Bank of approximately \$10,000 yesterday morning and escaped.

GENERAL IS ARRESTED ON MURDER CHARGE.

Vienna, April 13.—An unnamed general has been arrested on a charge of murdering military delinquents, it was announced here on Sunday. The officer, identified only as having held a high command during the war, it is alleged, removed from civil arrest large numbers of persons held as espionage suspects and caused them to be shot summarily.

QUITE A KICK IN IT, SAYS ANALYST.

A case against L. G. Morrell, charged with having liquor on his premises for illegal purposes and for manufacturing beer, was taken up yesterday afternoon in the police court. Inspectors McAlush and Merryfield and Detective Bidcombe said they went to 73 Etna street and found some gallons of beer which when analyzed contained 10.4 per cent alcohol. There was some money on the table. The case was postponed until Wednesday afternoon.

SAYS HE DID NOT LOSE NERVE.

A passenger in the motor boat going from Pleasant Point from Indian town last Saturday night when it broke down said today that he was the man who cried out for help. He said that a few minutes after the engine stopped the current carried the boat down below Marble Cove. He said he had no fear and he said there were two sets in the boat but no rowlocks. As there were twelve men in the boat and some were becoming badly frightened he said he called for help. He denied that he had lost his nerve. He said that the residents of Milford were paying for a service and it was not right that they should have their lives endangered.
