LORD SHAUGHNESSY
ON LABOR'S DEMANDS

(Montreal Herald.)

Lord Shaughnessy snowed the right attitude towards the labor problem when at the banquet on the occasion of his return from the old country, ne said that the present labor unrest involved some thing more than the question of hours and the rates of pay. He sees in this unrest a striving towards a higher standard of life on the part of the masses—a determination to lead healthier, happier lives, with the elimination of the squalor and misery which has too often in the past been associated with labor. The whole inference from his lordship's remarks was that it is the duty of all classes of the eftizens to show a spirit of sympathy and co-operation towards this new social evolution, to help to build up the national ideal.sm, and to promote a feeling of brotheriness between east and west, north and south, between every race and every class of citizens.

This is undoubtedly the spirit which should obtain. It involves a much great—
