## UNITED MINE WORKERS IN STORMY SESSION

Minneapolis, Jan. 17.—After the convening of the United Mine Workers of America had gone on record as the most turbulent organization of industries, the union members of the thirteen hundred delegates launched a resolution endorsing the strike of the political party of the workmen, but it met resistance. A stormy debate occupied the afternoon and the question went over until tomorrow. The resolution was adopted and the United Mine Workers withdrew from the American Federation of Labor, condemning the National Federation as an agent of reaction, and sharply criticizing Samuel Gompers, John Mitchell and other leaders of the Federation of Labor for co-operating with the C. I. Federation.

## COMMISSIONER REES HERE

Commissioner Rees of the Salvation Army arrived in the city yesterday afternoon. He is here again this time for St. Stephen. While in the city he said that he had had a letter from General Booth in which the latter said that he would be operated on soon at one of his eyes and that he expected to go to Europe in the spring. ## TWO WOMEN AIDS TO THE JUVENILE COURT

Sworn in in Montreal Yesterday as Special Investigators

Montreal, Jan. 18.—The swearing in of the first two women who ever held judicial offices in the province of Quebec, and almost without a precedent in the whole dominion, took place yesterday in the court-house, when Mrs. R. M. Henderson and Miss C. Clement, recently appointed probation officers in connection with the recently-formed juvenile court, took oath to carry out their duties faithfully. The duties under the stipulations of the act are the investigation of homes from which the children are picked up by police officers. They subsequently make reports to Mr. Justice Choquette, for his guidance in handling the cases. Miss Clement has been appointed to investigate Catholic cases, and Mrs. Henderson for the investigation of all other denominations. Their salary is \$800 yearly each.

## BEAUTY DOCTORING

This is the Work for Skilled Surgeons, Not Quacks

(London Chronicle) Beauty doctoring, or what the "Lancet" calls "decorative surgery," is a work to be taken seriously by the profession. Our contemporary, which, by the way, becomes a nonagenarian this year, tells us that "tattoos to cure, to remove, or, at least, to mitigate all facial deformities must be regarded as a very important part of a surgeon, not so important indeed as the relief of an obstruction of the bowel, or the removal of a malignant growth, but surely as important as the remedying of a knock-knee or the excision of a lipoma. "Decorative surgery is not only justifiable but is really essential for a large number of people if they are to pursue effectively the business of their lives, and we have only to determine what limits there are, if any, to surgical practice in this direction. "The responsibility of assisting the public by cosmetic operations is upon the medical profession. If surgeons will not undertake the manifold operations belonging to this class, the unqualified practitioner will step in and will carry out inefficiently the work neglected by the surgeon. It is true that the surgeon is willing to operate on hare-lips and a few of the more striking deformities, but many of the malformations he will not touch. In skilled hands the risk and danger are small, and with practice the results may be very good. The work must be undertaken as a real and important part of surgery, and when carried out with care much misery will be saved and many men and women will be rendered more capable of earning a livelihood.
