This is a move which will undoubtedly meet with the approval of fans in general, but it is doubtful if the officials themselves will favor it. There is one thing certain, if judges and referees were held personally responsible to the ringside fans at the time decisions are made they would take no chances of making any haphazard guesses as to the winner. In several bouts held locally decisions rendered have met with a storm of protest and there was considerable speculation as to who was responsible. If boxing commissions in general adopt this plan it should certainly do away with some weird guesses. In this city the judges usually act without any remuneration and it might be unfair to allow them to be made the target for verbal barrages hurled at them by unthinking fans. However, they should not be ashamed of their verdict if rendered conscientiously. If promoters and fans are dissatisfied with their work there is an easy remedy. 
