TWO OF THE most remarkable records in the history of sport, extending over a period of yeras, were brought to an end during the last twelvemonth. One of these was the wonderful consecutiv playing record of Everett Scott, veteran major league short-stop, and the other was the marvelous winning streak of the Passaic High School basketball team. The greatest record in baseball history for stamina and consecutive playing came to a close on May 6 when Scott was benched by Manager Miller Huggins of the Yankees. The contest on that day was the first that the noted short-stop had missed since 1916, almost nine years before. During his long period of playing in consecutive games Scott took part in a total of 1,807 contests. The previous record for playing in consecutive games was 1,127 and this was made by a minor leaguer, Perry Lipe, formerly of the Southern League. Scott surpassed this record on Sept. 14, 1923, and then he went through another full season and a part of the past one before his remarkable string was broken. The former major league record was 577 games and this was made by George B. Pinckney while with the old oklyn club of the American Association and the National League from 1885 to 1890. The other great record that came to an end during the past year was stopped on Feb. 6. This occurred when the Passaic High School basketball team suffered its first defeat after piling up a record of 150 consecutive victories.
