
REFINERY STRIKE MAY BE SETTLED

Reported Today That Prospects For Agreement Are Brighter

A meeting of the employees of the Atlantic Sugar Refineries was held this morning when various phases of the strike situation were gone into. It was understood that an adjustment of the trouble was expected during the day, but nothing of a definite nature was reported up to the time of going to press.

Mr. Seidenstecker, manager of the Atlantic Refineries, Ltd., said today that the company had signed on quite a number of men today. The plant was running and sugar being produced. Otherwise there was nothing new in the situation.

E. G. McQuirk, representative of the department of labor, said this morning that he considered the prospects for an early settlement of the strike excellent. Mr. Quirk had a conference with Mayor Hayes this morning. In conversation with some of those who are interested in the men's side of the case it was learned this morning that there is a tendency on the part of the men to accept the forty cent per hour rate offered by the company. There is one obstacle in the way of a settlement, however, and that is the attitude of the company towards some of the former who joined the strikers. It is said that the management is willing to take these men back but not on their former capacities. The other men insist that the former should be reinstated if they return to work.
