THE ATLANTIC MAIL SERVICE

Yesterday afternoon the St. John Board of Trade passed a lengthy resolution, in regard to the Atlantic mail service.

This resolution stated that the subsidy of \$500,000 per annum offered by the Dominion Government for the establishment of an express mail service had proved inefficient, and expressed the opinion that the grant of any large amount of money for the purpose of establishing a new express mail service would be a waste of public funds.

The resolution also stated that the Board of Trade was of the opinion that the establishment of a new express mail service would be a waste of public funds, and that the Government should not be asked to subsidize such a service.

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ST. JOHN'S MURDER

The President of the Board of Trade speaks on the subject.

The resolutions before the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon in regard to the Atlantic mail service, as they were published in the Gazette.

In speaking to the members of the Board, the President of the Board, Mr. George Robertson, said that it was a very sad reflection that a quarter of a century of waiting, and after helping to develop the great Northwest, that things should be as they are.

Facilities for business were provided at Halifax, and why not at St. John which is nearly 100 miles nearer Montreal even by the Intercolonial? He could see no reason why at an enormous cost, and rolled upon common taxation, that works as the benefit of it should be cut off from the Maritime Province.

The present state of affairs should no longer exist and he was satisfied that the people of the Maritime Province would be in the most effective manner till it was remedied, and that the St. John people should be satisfied with the result.
