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DICK TIBBITS SUSPENDED.

M. P. A. A. Will Investigate—His Amateur Standing Sanctioned for Sports in St. John.

The following official bulletins from Secretary G. Fred Pearson, secretary of the M. P. A. A. are self-explanatory: Corey McKinnon and Gilbert Goulet, of Moncton, N. B., and James (Dick) Tibbits, of Fredericton, N. B., are hereby suspended pending investigation, the former two for competing in an unsanctioned skating race at Moncton, N.B., and the latter for playing professional baseball.

Sanction is granted the secretary of the St. John freeman sports committee for the holding of the following events to be contested at St. John, N. B., to be held in St. John, N. B., on Monday evening, Jan. 19th, 1904, viz: Half mile and mile races, and half mile boys' race.

Sanction is granted the committee of the Father Mathew Association for the holding of the following events to be contested at St. John, N. B., on Monday, the 25th day of January, 1904, viz: 200 yard open; boys' race, 16 years and under; 440 yards open; speaking; members of association; half mile women's race; obstacle race; one mile race (open); temperance race, open to members of temperance societies; two mile relay race, open to teams of four; one mile race, open to all unions, and snow-shoe race (open).

All organizations in St. John, New Brunswick, which desire the sanction of this association for any events or contests over which this association has jurisdiction, are requested to apply in the first instance to Kenneth J. McRae, Pugsley Building, St. John, N. B., who will transmit the application for sanction to the secretary of this association, where it will be promptly dealt with.

A PECULIAR DISEASE.

Within the past day or two attention of medical men has been drawn to a case of Hodgkin's disease, of which a prominent citizen died. This disease is very rare, and no case of it has previously been reported in the city for quite a number of years. About eighteen months ago it was thought that a patient in the hospital was suffering from it, but his affliction later on turned out to be another form of blood trouble.

Hodgkin's disease is a condition of the blood in which the red corpuscles undergo a change and take on a yellowish appearance. The face of the patient becomes, in some instances, a bright yellow, and eventually death results. As yet there is no known cure.

Addison's disease is another affliction of the blood equally as rare, but in it the flesh of the patient becomes copper colored.
