POPE WON'T RECEIVE LOUBET President of France May Not Enter the Vatican and Interfere With Pope's Plans.

PARIS, April 19.—The Rome correspondent of the Echo de Paris affirms positively, despite all denials that the French government has made strenuous efforts to arrange a reception for President Loubet at the Vatican, during his visit to Rome, first through the French ambassador to Italy with the pope's permission, and finally through a French archbishop and a French cardinal, only ceasing when it was found that the pope was intransigent.

SKIRMISHING ON THE YALU. Japanese Have Full Possession of Korea. And Have Now Two Armies Marching on Manchuria—Makarov's Successor Greeted.

LIAO YANG, April 19.—A number of unimportant skirmishes are reported along the Yalu river. Six Japanese soldiers were killed by Russian snipers on April 18. Firing was heard on April 18, but the result of the engagement is unknown.

SHANGHAI, April 19, noon.—Authentic advice from Seoul, dated 12th inst, declare that the Japanese are in complete control of Korea and that the Russian scouting parties have retired across the Yalu, and that the Japanese army, which occupied Wiju, practically without resistance. The Japanese army is divided into two forces, one an expeditionary force and the other for occupation. The former, numbering 45,000, is advancing to the Yalu, and the latter, numbering 25,000, is making for sighted communication arrangements with the headquarters at Seoul, where there is a garrison of 40,000.

MAKAROV'S SUCCESSOR. ST. PETERSBURG, April 19.—Vice-Admiral Skrydloff arrived here on his way to the Far East, which he will command of the Russian fleet at Port Arthur. The admiral was accorded an enthusiastic reception by the people who thronged the streets. There were repeated outbreaks of enthusiastic cheers as the admiral left the car, and from the hundreds of a peasant stepped out and presented Skrydloff with a copy of a picture entitled "The Holy Virgin of Joy to the admiral," which is reputed to have miraculous power.
