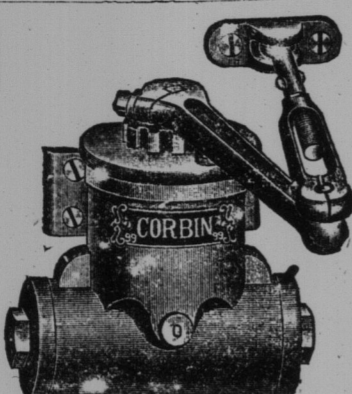

INCENDIARY KILLS FOUR.

Set Fire to a New York Tenement. Four Suffocated and Two Fatally Injured Today—Firemen and Police Save Many.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—Four persons were suffocated and two were overcome by smoke in a fire which gutted a five-story brick double tenement house at 15 Moore street, Williamsburg, early today. Two of the injured, a boy and a girl, probably will die.

BATTLE RESUMED; RUSSIANS RALLY

They Capture a Japanese Position and Eleven Guns—Russian Losses Over 40,000 Men.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 17, 1.15 p. m.—Official reports received by the war office, dated early this morning, say that the battle resumed last night. The Russians still hold the right bank of the Shalke river, while the pressure on the Russian left has been relieved, and the contest on the right is continuing.

BABY'S BODY IN A FURNACE.

A Horrible Find Made in Woodstock.

Child's Mother, a Servant—Under Arrest Charged With Murder—Coroner's Inquest.

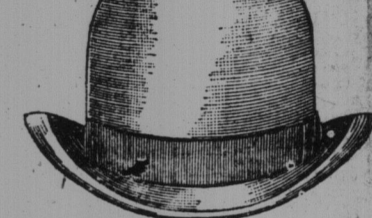
(Special to the Star). WOODSTOCK, Oct. 17.—The body of a female infant, apparently well developed, was found by G. W. Vanwart and his hired man in Mr. Vanwart's furnace yesterday. A girl named Linda Drosse, a domestic, working for the past two weeks for J. N. W. Winslow, and for some years previous for G. W. Vanwart, has been arrested on suspicion of being the mother of the child, and of having murdered it and placed the body where it was found.

Coroner W. W. Hay began an investigation this morning. Mr. Vanwart, the first witness, said that yesterday morning he went down to the furnace with his man, named Robert Magee. He told Magee to clean out the furnace preparatory to building a fire. The body of an infant was found. He had suspected a domestic who had been in his employ up to about two weeks previous, and who had been working at J. N. W. Winslow's, but sleeping at his home, of being en route and had accused her of it, and she had admitted that she was. When he found the body he called to her in her room, she was in bed, and told her of what he had discovered. She told him to do with it what he liked. Her name was Linda Drosse. J. N. W. Winslow said that Linda Drosse worked at his house as a domestic for the past two weeks. She worked every day from half-past six in the morning to eight in the evening. Robert Magee gave evidence corroborating that of Mr. Vanwart as to the finding of the body of the infant. The inquest was then adjourned until half-past one this afternoon. In order that the testimony of Dr. Hand may be given, as well as other witnesses. In the meanwhile the girl, Linda Drosse, is held in goal, pending the result of the inquiry.
