

The contract with the Allan Company, entered into in 1905, had practically expired and a new service was particularly desirable in view of the French treaty. If they did not maintain a direct steamship service between Canada and France they would lose the benefit in many cases of the French minimum tariff and be obliged to pay a surtax.
