BRING RESULTSCATTLE SHIPMENTS SHOW
A LARGE DECREASEOnly 20,000 Head Went Forward This
Season as Against 30,000
Last Year.The steamer Montfort, which sailed
for London on Sunday, took away 601
head of cattle. This completes the live
stock shipments for the winter. The
totals have been as follows:Cattle.....19,809
Sheep.....4,183
Horses.....51
Last season the total shipments
were:
Cattle.....20,528
Sheep.....1,062
Horses.....59
There has thus been a decrease of
20,528 head of cattle, an increase of
2,116 sheep and a decrease of 8 horses
during the season just ended.HE DID NOT LIKE BEING
CALLED A BAD MANLively Squabble Between Lawyer and
Witness in a Quo Case
Today.In the police court this morning the
charge preferred against Arthur Fox,
by Fred Martin, of borrowing a gun,
selling it and converting the money to
his own use, was continued.S. A. M. Skinner appeared for the
prosecution, and S. B. Rustin for the
defense. The defendant gave evidence
that he was with the plaintiff in a
South African contingent for about 17
months, and on their return, in 1902,
he borrowed a rifle from Martin. The
latter said he owed witness five dollars
and said if he could get ten dollars
for the gun to sell it and give him
half. Defendant said he sold the gun
and left Martin's five dollars in the
care of Richard Whelley, and Martin
admitted receiving the money.To Mr. Skinner the defendant said he
played poker in South Africa with
Martin. Looking at the plaintiff Mr.
Bustin said that Martin was one of
these goody, goody fellows. Martin in-
formed Mr. Bustin that it was not
necessary for him to give any call-
downs.Mr. Bustin became angry and said:
"You are a bad, bad man, you are a
bad, vindictive man, lying like a snake
in the grass for five years, waiting for
this man."Martin then informed the lawyer
that he might have to prove that he
was a bad man. The magistrate put the
defendant through a severe cross examina-
tion, in which the defendant swore that he
did not think if he told Martin that he
sold the gun and spent the money for
him. The gun was sold to Jos.
Lattimer.Richard Whelley testified that Fox
gave him a five dollar bill to give to
Martin, who received the money.
The case was adjourned until this af-
ternoon.NEW BOSTON EXPRESS
MADE FIRST TRIP TODAYTrain Built by the Three Roads Will
Perform the Service From
St. John.Some time ago the Star announced
that for the St. John-Boston service
the C. P. R. Maine Central and Bos-
ton and Maine railroads would unite
in building two trains to be operated
by the three railroads working togeth-
er. These trains have been completed,
and the first one arrived in St. John
today. It was the principal topic of
interest at the depot this forenoon.
Heretofore the Boston trains have
been made up of cars taken from
whatever road happened to have any
handy; there was uncertainty as to
who should look after the cars, and
the service generally was not up to
that given by the C. P. R. on its own
trains.Hereafter it is hoped there will be
great improvement, as these trains
now on the run are new, fresh from
the shops, and will be operated under
a definite agreement as to care, crews,
etc. They will during the summer
run between Point du Chene and St.
John, and passengers will make the
journey without change of cars. The
train which arrived today consisted
of baggage, first and second class
coaches, smoker and Pullman. The
cars are painted the C. P. R. color, and
bear the names of the three lines over
which they run, as well as the infor-
mation that they are exclusively for
the St. John-Boston service.
