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SERIOUS SHOOTING

AFRAY AT EDMUNDSTON

Swedish Employee of G. T. P. Riddled With Bullets in Row at Indian Camp and May Day.

EDMUNDSTON, N. B., May 28.—As the result of a shooting affair Wednesday night in the Indian camp about a mile from this town, one of the laborers on the G. T. P. is now in the hospital here and may die. The man is a Swede. It is supposed that he wandered into one of the camps and that the Indians. His friends heard the noise of shooting about 11:30 p. m.

The wounded man was taken to the hospital where Dr. Grey attended him. It is reported this evening that the man was in a serious condition and that while there was a chance of recovery, the probability was that he would die.

There is considerable mystery about the affair, and so far no arrests have been made.

DAM BROKE; TRAIN ENGULFED

NORTH BAY, May 28.—The Current River dam at Port Arthur was out at midnight, carrying destruction over a wide area and sweeping away two C. P. R. bridges.

Part of the dam is still in the wreck. A freight train from the east was caught in the mad whirl of waters and in an instant the locomotive was buried under many feet of mud and water, blotting out the lives of the engineer, fireman and brakeman.

The rest of the train ended in the caecae were warned in time of the on-rushing flood and managed to scramble to high ground.

Five lives this morning the waters have revealed ten feet, but the bodies of the trainmen are still in the wreck. Part of the cab is visible and one hand and one foot of the dead engineer are visible.

The dead are engineer Savard, a married man of Schreiber; Fireman John Schreiber, unmarried; and Brakeman Immann, also of Schreiber. The wires east of Port Arthur are down.

WILD BEAR WALKED IN PUBLIC STREETS

A hunting party was at once organized and gave chase to brute, which sought to escape by taking to the harbor.
