

TROOPS SACK AN IRISH TOWN

Riots and Looting Avenge a Sinn Fein Murder—Led by An Officer.

(Daily Express Correspondent). Cork, Sept. 22.—The murder of a young soldier of the Shropshire Light Infantry by the Sinn Fein who held up the church parade at Fermoy on Sunday has led to an outbreak which has left the town practically wrecked.

What was unquestionably behind the rioting was the anger of the British troops at the action of the Sinn Fein in returning a verdict of murder at the instigation of their dead comrade. The jury added a rider to their verdict to the effect that the Sinn Fein attackers had no intention of killing any one, and this gist of the verdict was the cause of the rioting.

From 8.30 to ten on Monday night rioting raged in Fermoy. The troops, about 250 of them, all of the Shropshire Light Infantry, moved about the streets methodically wrecking shops and houses fronted—especially those believed to be inhabited by members of the Sinn Fein and followed by scores of women, who helped them in their looting.

COCO COLA CO. PROVIDES SUGAR FOR WINNIPEG

Eight Carolads Have Been Placed in the Hands of Board of Commerce Distribution Through Jobbers.

Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 24.—At morning's session of the Board of Commerce, Commissioner James announced that five carloads of a new brand of sugar had been ordered to relieve the shortage has been in the hands of eight Winnipeg jobbers for distribution through the province by the Board of Commerce. This sugar has been ordered to the Board, said Mr. Auld, the Coca Cola Company, and is to be used where the product is available to be used solely for the purpose of fruit preserving and not to fill any orders of the jobbers. Evidence will be admitted to the board by firms handling the sugar to show the nature of the distributions.

In making this announcement, Commissioner Auld said that the Coca Cola Company's position had generally misunderstood. "There is no doubt that the reason for the apparent excessive sugar used by Mr. Auld, was due simply to their method of buying. I do think there has been an excess of hoarding. In view of the sugar shortage, it is better to have a few carloads of sugar on hand than to have none at all."
