

RUSSIA ONLY WAITING FOR A NAPOLEON

People Are Tired of Lenin
and His Reign of
Terror.

WOULD WELCOME A
NATIONAL LEADER

Bolsheviks Are Suspicious of
the Army and Keep Families
of Officers as Hostages.

Berlin, Sept. 9.—The Russian count Alexander Stepanovich Bolevich, an intimate friend of the late Leo Tolstoy and a strong believer in a constitutional monarchy, has arrived here after meeting with countless adventures since he succeeded in making his escape from the Bolsheviks who plundered his estates nearly two years ago. During this time he has worn many disguises and mingled with all classes of the Russian population who, he declares, are thoroughly tired of Leninism and sighing for the appearance of a strong national leader to liberate them from the tyranny of Trotsky.

Recalls French Revolution.
"In a great many respects," the Count said to me at his hotel here today, "conditions in Russia at the present moment bear a strong resemblance to those in France at the time of the Great Revolution, and the war against Poland has emphasized the similarity."

"The small Jewish clique at Moscow now ruling the country has found an easy task to terrorize the Russian bourgeoisie through their gang of hired Chinese and Jewish henchmen and assassins, but these forces would scarcely have been sufficient for a real war. Then, fortunately for them, came the war with Poland, which gave the impulse to a strong patriotic movement similar to that which enabled the ragged, barefooted troops of the French Revolution to defeat the seasoned soldiers of the other European states."

Officers Not Bolsheviks.
"M. Radok, the finest journalistic pen of Soviet Russia, quite frankly admits that the majority of the officers who at the present moment are leading the red armies from victory to victory have absolutely no inclinations toward Bolshevism. They are simply young patriotic men of the same age as the French revolutionary generals who later on became the marshals of the first French Empire. Old General Brusilov is nothing more than a figurehead who follows the initiative of his general staff as Hindenburg followed von Ludendorff and the entire work of organizing behind the front is in the hands of the highly gifted Kamenev, whose real name is Rosenfeld, and who is the Carnot of Soviet Russia."

"Because the army in Russia stands on a different political foundation from that of the central government, the latter is always suspicious of its army officers. The Soviet government has its commissioners who follow each of the generals and are their superior in rank. With his usual oriental craftiness, Lenin has, besides, been careful enough to get all the nearest relatives of the officers in his power. If any of these should think of a coup d'état or counter-revolutionary plot, he knows that his wife and children would pay for his crime by being slowly tortured to death by Lenin's executioners."

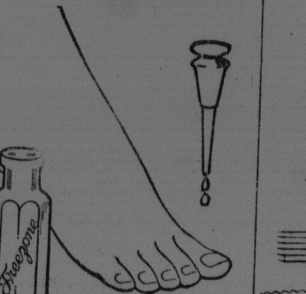
Lenin in Fear.
"Still, nothing is more certain than that Lenin's greatest and constant fear is that a Russian Napoleon may arise. This is the reason he would grant anything that is the reason for the 'General Wrangle.' A student of Russian history is bound to arise as surely as all patriotic Russians fear that Lenin and Trotsky may end as did Robespierre and Danton before them."

TRANSPORT OF ARMS TO BE PROHIBITED

Germany Moves to Check
Illicit Traffic in Arms and
Munitions Which is Prevalent.

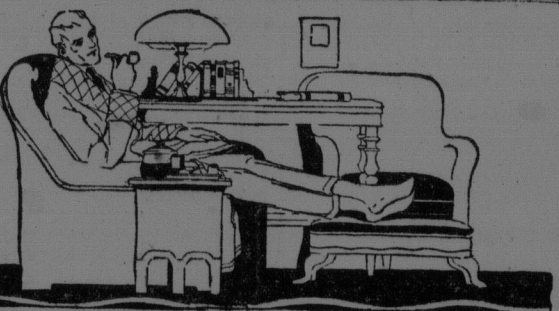

Berlin, Sept. 9.—The illicit disposal of arms and munitions, apparently for sale abroad contrary to provisions of the peace treaty, has assumed large proportions since the passage of the disarmament law, according to an official statement of Commissioner Peter, appointed by the government to enforce the pledges made at Spa for the confiscation of all arms in the possession of the population and for surrender to the extent for destruction.

This attempt to evade the requirements set both at Spa and Versailles has occasioned special measures to deal with the problem along the lines adopted in the United States to enforce prohibition, namely, by absolute prohibition against transportation of anything except property authorized by the government.

The only exceptions are the shipments of condemned military materials under the Versailles treaty, supplies for the Entente garrisons in the plebeian areas and movements of arms or armed bodies belonging to the German army or police, all of which must be covered by open orders. The railroad authorities will call for the assistance of the workmen, all of whom can be counted upon to report illicit shipments to enforce the regulation. The chairman of the district unions sits upon the commission to supervise the execution.

The Nationalist parties fought hard against that provision, declaring it a recognition of "outside government." A representative of the German People's party, even threatened that his party would withdraw from the cabinet unless workmen were forbidden to interfere with the transportation of munitions, but the regulation went through the Reichstag committee unchanged.

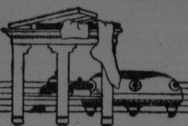

RED ENVOY NOW AT CHRISTIANA

M. Litvinov Says His Mission
is to Establish Business
With Norway and Russia.

Copenhagen, Sept. 9.—The Bolshevik ambassador, M. Litvinov, arrived at Christiania yesterday. He was traveling in a first-class car, but leaned against a third-class car to be photographed for a Socialist paper. From his hotel, M. Litvinov sent the following statement to the press: "The chief object for my visit here is to create a basis for solid business connections between Norway and Russia. The Russian Government and M. Venturov are waiting for the establishment of a central store for Russian goods in one of the Scandinavian states; and Norway is especially interesting for North Russia because of the great Norwegian language and that country's many excellent harbors. Russia must have trustworthy representatives to take care of its interests in the states with which it trades, and it is not less important for Norway to have representatives in Russia. The Norwegian and Russian foreign secretaries decided that I should come to Christiania to make final agreement in this question."
