VICTORIA REBELS  
AGAINST LORD'S DAY ACT

Citizens and Storekeepers Declined to Observe Order of Police Commission.

Victoria, B. C., May 12.—By an overwhelming vote, Victoria ratepayers today voted against the rigid enforcement of the Lord's Day Act as recently proposed by the Victoria Police Commission. When the citizens and storekeepers declined to observe the order of the commission a plebiscite on the subject was ordered. This plebiscite was held today. Leading of the Lord's Day Alliance, including Dr. Hooper of Toronto have declined to recognize the legality of the local plebiscite and the outcome of the matter is still in doubt. The vote, however, is said to equal almost five to one against the Lord's Day Act.

Held In Montreal

Wells of England Won Canadian Welterweight Title from Frank Barrieau in Ten Rounds.

Montreal, May 12.—Bernard Wells, of London, England, won the Canadian welterweight championship from Frank Barrieau, at the Mount Royal Arena here tonight, in a ten-round bout. The men weighed 135 and 145 pounds, respectively. Wells was too clever for the titleholder, out-boxing him in every round. He used his left hand with effect and had Barrieau groggy at the end of the tenth round.

In the semi-finals, Sammy Morris, of Montreal, 145 pounds, welterweight, knocked out Jack Jarvis, of Toronto, 147 pounds, in the sixth round of their scheduled ten-round bout.

ANGRY CROWDS  
ATTACK PACIFIC  
MILL WORKERS

Mob of Several Hundred Rush Overseers and Office Help Leaving Plant.

Lawrence, Mass., May 12.—As overseers and members of the office staff of the Lawrence Pacific mills left the plant at 3 o'clock this afternoon a crowd of several hundred strike sympathizers assembled on the Common for a mass meeting of the One Big Union rushed them, shouting and jeering. Several of the overseers were roughly handled before police arrived, but none were seriously injured.

For nearly two hours the crowd remained about the mill gates, but no more employees came out. Minor disturbances at the Lawrence Pacific mills began early today when 300 pickets assembled at the plant and jeered office help on their way to work.

Manchester, N. H., May 12.—This is a time of conferences among textile strikers and representatives of the state labor board. So far nothing has come of the conferences. This afternoon Commissioner Davis came to Manchester and conferred with Agent Dexter of the Stark mills. He was scheduled to talk with the Stark mill strike committee. Both sides had agreed to meet the labor commissioner, but the mill officials declined to participate in any joint conference. Agent W. P. Straw of the Amoskeag Company is in New York today, and a personal conference with him will not be probable until his return.

Carpentier And  
Dempsey To Fight

Agreement for Meeting in London or Paris—Dempsey Host at Luncheon in London.

London, May 12.—Jack Dempsey, Georges Carpentier and Ted "Kid" Lewis and their managers and trainers and thirty newspaper men had luncheon today as the guests of Dempsey and Jack Kearns, who are sailing tomorrow for New York.

At the luncheon Kearns forecast a return fight between Dempsey and Carpentier in Europe within a year. He said that an agreement for a meeting between the two heavyweights in London or Paris before next May had been reached between himself and Francis Donaghy, the man who guides the affairs of Carpentier.

According to Kearns, he and Dempsey decided to leave the promotion of the bout to the person offering the best terms for it. Neither Carpentier nor Dempsey is prohibited from engaging in encounters with other men prior to the battle in Europe, but a defeat for either of the heavyweights would result in the agreement being automatically cancelled.

During the luncheon Carpentier toasted Lewis, who was defeated by the Frenchman Thursday evening. He called Lewis a good sportsman.

While Kearns included Paris as the possible scene for Dempsey's next bout with the Frenchman the best informed followers of boxing in London believe London easily is the favorite for the contest.

Last night's attendance at the Carpentier-Lewis fight, which it is conceded would not compare with the crowd Dempsey and Carpentier would attract, was a revelation to Kearns. One promoter, who declares he can guarantee 25,000 for a meeting between the United States and French boxers, has impressed Kearns with the financial possibilities of a fight at White City where is situated the large stadium erected for the Olympic games of 1908.

White City is an enormous exhibition grounds. The stadium was constructed to seat 75,000 persons, 15,000 seats being under cover. It is claimed that the seating accommodation could be increased to 107,000, at an expense far short of the cost of construction of such a stadium as Boy's thirty acres in Jersey City, N. J., where Dempsey knocked out Carpentier last July.

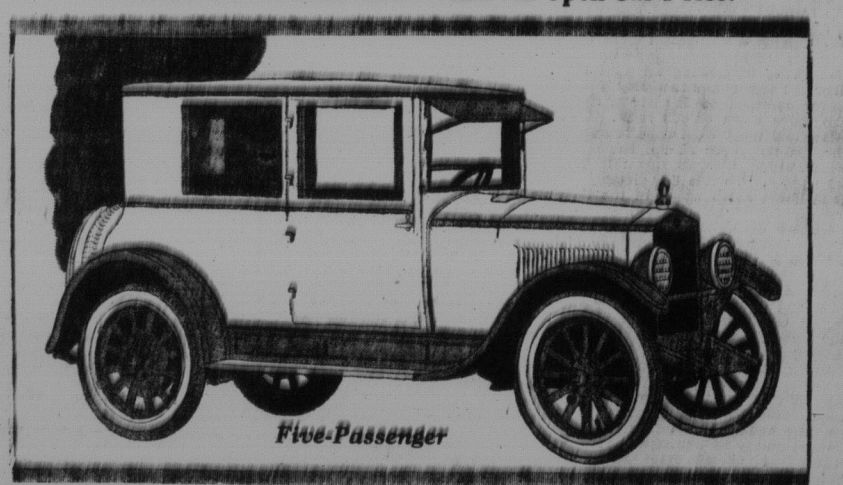
