The policy of the Opposition, in refusing a Royal Commission for the examination of all witnesses, and then publishing detached masses of the evidence in their possession against the Government, does not seem like the policy of prosecutors confident of their case. First came the private letters of Sir Hugh Allan, full of gushing boasts of his own prowess. "The case against the Government is proved," cried the enemies of the Government in chorus. "The charges are disproved." And now another onslaught is made on the Government by the Opposition artillery. And, please, clearer, deadlier than before, the guns double shot with compromising letters and telegrams. We have learned to be calm amid political warfare, and shall not boil over with condemnation of the accused until we hear their defence. The tortuous ways in which the evidence is allowed to reach the public, the shirking of the prosecutors from putting their witnesses on oath, and the enormity of the charges, make us pause for the other side. Mr. McMillen charges Sir Francis Hincks with having asked \$50,000 for his influence with the Government. This is too crushing a charge to be believed on the mere word of Mr. McMillen. We want proofs. If they are ready, let us have them at once. Perhaps they are ready and are kept back to see if Sir Francis Hincks will not publish an affidavit declaring his innocence. Their publication then would create a greater sensation, a more highly dramatic effect.

If the Government did sell the contract for a price, as McMillen declares, they must vacate the offices they hold. The good name of Canada requires it. The party so long led by them will demand it. The Governor General, Parliament and people will insist on it.

Should the apparently conclusive case presented by McMillen not be overthrown Sir Hugh Allan will stand before the country a convicted perjurer. It was surely enough that he should be convicted of having corrupted the press and priesthood, and attempted to sell his country. It is to be convicted of perjury also? When his late affidavit was published Mr. Holton said he always knew Sir Hugh Allan to be the greatest liar in Canada but he didn't know before that he would venture to lie in the face of his country. It is Mr. Holton's estimate of the man to be proved accurate?

It is worthy of remark that the accused are all knights. Sir George, Sir Francis, Sir John, and Sir Hugh form the knightly quartette charged with the burden of this great responsibility. It will be found quite as CHEAP, and Retail much better than any other Cotton in the market.

Local Carriers.
It is strange that the most scandalous acts committed by respected people with impunity should be connected with church government and done under the name of religion. Among the most disreputable of ecclesiastical scandals are the constantly recurring squabbles between clergy and congregations that disgrace the Episcopal Church in particular and organized Christianity in general. If the angels in heaven weep at the desecration of the name of God by his professed people, Moncton affords a chance for copious tears. The Rector of a Parish, the pastor of a flock of God's people, is told by freemasons of his parishioners to leave, that his doctrines and practices are offensive, and yet he holds on to his place, forcing the majority of his people to procure another pastor! And this in the name of God and his church! The new pastor has been forbidden to preach in the parish by the Bishop (in the name of God also), and he has decided to withdraw. Next winter there will be a bill before the Legislature for the erection of a new parish within the Rev. Mr. Walker's parish. The St. Stephen force will then be played over again. And all in the name of God and religion!

Shipping Notes.
Sole of *Vesuvius*. - The ship N. Boynton, 105 tons, now loading at this port, has been sold to Messrs. G. C. Lord & Co., of Boston, for \$50,000. She is about 7 years old.

The brig *Veteran*, registering 197 tons, built at Liverpool, N. S., in 1858, has been sold at auction at New York for \$3275.

The brig *Leader*, David master, from Cow Bay, C. B., for Portland, put into Halifax, N. S., on the 18th inst., with loss of foremast head, foretopmast and topgallantmast and maintopmast.

The *Derelict Victoria*. - The steamer Louisiana, from Colon, which arrived at St. Nazaire on the 24th June, passed, on the 18th, in lat. 32 E., lon. 1, close to the derelict brig *Victoria*, of this port, which had malamat and maltopmast standing; also foremast, with foreyard attached, foretopmast broken, bowsprit standing, with jibboom broken; the vessel was upright, with the water 40 centimetres from the deck; she appeared to have been in collision; the stem and stern were intact.

The schooner *Comrade*, Granville master, at Portland 16th inst., from Fredericton, met with heavy weather on the passage, losing part of her deckload of shingles.
