

not a little to tax both time and patience, they are amply rewarded by being made the medium of conveying relief to even a few of the poor, starving, shivering, ill-housed beings, to whom winter comes armed with such terrors—among whom, whatever may be their faults, are no long laid up stores of provisions, or fuel, or clothing.

If the Church people of St. John are disposed again to place in the hands of the Committee the means to alleviate the wants and deprivations of their poorer brethren, the Committee again tender their services for the distribution of such alms. All that they ask is, that whatever is given may be given cheerfully, and in the conviction that it will be wisely and carefully dispensed: and they pray the continued blessing of God on this humble effort to comfort some of his destitute ones.
