To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Prince Edward Island, A. F. & A. M.

I beg leave to submit the following Report, as the Representative of the Grand Lodge of Utah near this Grand Lodge, and in doing so will endeavor to present to view all matters of interest.

The Eighth Annual Communication was held at Salt Lake City. commencing 11th November, 1879, when all the Lodges (six) were represented. The R. W., Frank Tilford, Deputy, Grand Master, presiding.
