AIR BUBBLES GIVE CITY WATER MILKY APPEARANCE CLAIM

Quite Harmless, Declares General Manager E. V. Buchanan.

Complaints from residents, especially from the east end of the city, about the milkiness of the city water were very numerous this morning, and in reply to a question about the matter, General Manager E. V. Buchanan of the P. U. C. stated that he has not yet been able to determine the cause of this phenomenon.

"It is quite harmless, being caused merely by very minute air bubbles," remarked Mr. Buchanan, as he gave an explanation of the water's milky appearance. "When the water was first seen in the glass it had a decidedly milky appearance, but when I had stood on the table for a second or two, this milkiness disappeared. A close look at the water showed that the milky appearance was due to minute bubbles of air, which could be seen rising rapidly to the top of the water in the glass and disappearing."

"The reason the aerated appearance should be seen in the water drawn from the mains at a distance from the pumps and aerating basin, I have not yet been able to find out," said Mr. Buchanan. "This does not mean, however, as much as the iron which is present in the city water. This trouble will, however, be solved by the time the new aerating plant is ready. That will be in about three months time. The proportion of iron in the water is about three parts in a million, but while quite harmless it is not so good for laundry purposes."
