The chief item of importance, naturally was the proposed comfort stations for both men and women and the work on these buildings will be proceeded with and rushed to completion. The ladies rest room if the idea of the Board is carried out will be an imposing building. Estimates have been received as to the probable cost and as they are within the cost as estimated by the Board there should be no delay in proceeding with the building. This building will most likely be of brick while the men's will be of stone.

The proposed memorial driveway was also discussed and the Board will visit the Park on Friday night and look over the land and most likely decide on the location. The planting of 200 trees in honor of the boys who went overseas will also be disposed of and no doubt work will be commenced on this worthy object at once.

Annual Meeting of Canadian Felt Co.

Profits in 1918 at \$49,804 Compare With \$43,338 the Preceding Year.

Montreal, April 22.—Although sales of the Canadian Consolidated Felt Company, Ltd., in the twelve months ended December 31 last exceeded by nearly \$400,000 those of the previous year, the 1918 total of \$1,155,192 compared with \$763,481 in 1917, net profits from the year's operations increased by only \$26,465, being shown in the statement submitted at the annual meeting of the enterprise held here to-day. Net profits amounted to \$69,804 in 1918, against \$43,338 the previous year, after all selling and general expenses, taxes, bond and other interest, and provisions for depreciation, bad debts and income tax. The total surplus stood at \$250,039, as at December 31 last.

The balance sheet shows a working capital of some \$200,000, current assets standing at \$714,304, against current liabilities of \$515,879. Of the former cash on hand is shown at \$7,979, compared with \$10,395, at the end of 1917. Accounts and notes receivable show an increase of nearly \$50,000 to a total of \$91,526, due, in all probability, to the more extensive business done during the year. Upwards of \$43,000 worth of the company's bonds were retired during the twelve months and surpluses were increased nearly \$70,000 to a total of \$484,252.

The following officers were elected at the meeting: W. A. Eden, President; R. E. Jamieson, Vice-President; C. B. Seger, G. W. Charles, Y. E. Mitchell, K. C. W. Binnmore, P. Y. Smiley, H. Wellein and A. D. Thornton, directors. T. H. Rieder's resignation from the board was announced and a resolution expressing the company's appreciation of his long service was passed unanimously.

Says New Building Should be Erected

Collegiate Board Awaiting Dr. Merchant's Report.

At the regular Collegiate Board meeting it was decided to defer plans for a new collegiate building. The following motion was passed:

"That action regarding the plans for the proposed Collegiate building be deferred pending the receipt of Dr. Merchant's report, when copies of the report will be furnished the members of the Board and a special meeting called to deal with the entire question."

Inspector Houston of the Department, upon the building of a new school. Among other things he says:

Grading of Accommodations

1.—Heating and water supply, first class; school grounds, cap rooms, desks, blackboards and assembly hall, second class; school buildings, waiting rooms, closets, class rooms, halls, teachers' private room, lighting and ventilation, third class; gymnasium, fourth class.

The old part of the Building is as bad as can be. I need not go into details, the grading above tells the story. The Board should form a broad scheme for technical and academic education; they have now the opportunity of establishing an institution which would provide facilities for advanced work along almost every line of activity.

2.—The supply of equipment is very good, but facilities for making use of it are by no means what they should be. Up-to-date laboratories are very much needed.

3.—Organization—Generally satisfactory.

4.—Attendance, boys 140, girls 136, total 276.

5.—Character of teaching—All teachers of the staff given highest grading.

6.—Character of pupils' work—Classes examined in reading, writing and spelling are above the average. Work in "art" satisfactory, and very good in the Middle School.

7.—Special Reports—School cannot be granted approval with present antiquated building.

Conditions, so far as the staff is concerned, are good, and effective work is being done.

Now that the war is over, plans should be at once prepared for new quarters to provide for more extended technical and vocational work, gymnasium, assembly hall, laboratories, teachers' rooms, class rooms, etc., always keeping in view the future growth of the city, and making adequate provision for it. This is an excellent academic, technical and commercial institute.

The Board endorsed the idea of organizing a Chamber of Commerce in this city but expressed disapproval of the bringing representatives of the American City Bureau here to organize the same.

Brig. Gen. Gunn Wishes to Retire

BUSINESS AFFAIRS REQUIRE HIS WHOLE ATTENTION.

TORONTO, April 24.—In an interview Brig.-Gen. John A. Gunn, C.M.G., D.S.O., G.O.C. of the Toronto Military District, this morning confirmed the rumor that he is retiring at his own wish. "A short time ago I wrote the Minister of Militia reminding him that I was still in command here," General Gunn told the reporter. "You see I was only temporary in command. My private interests are becoming very urgent. The need for my entire attention to business affairs is becoming pressing and as things are now I have practically no time to spare."

"I have asked to be relieved by June 1st if possible, but in any case I shall remain until my successor arrives."

General Gunn has been devoting all his time since he took command to the affairs of the returned and discharged soldiers, and has worked very strenuously in the Reparation League and other soldiers' organizations.

As to his successor rumor has already supplied the name of Major-General Elmslie C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., who returns shortly from Siberia but Gen. Gunn said he would prefer not to say who he considered is about to succeed

when the inevitable fruit, cereal and eggs, breakfast ceases to tempt the appetite why not try a few variations by adopting some luncheon tidbits into the morning menu? Leftovers of fish, some vegetables, ornaments can be included to make a dainty breakfast dish.

Here were a few suggestions:

Egg Variations—Tomato Omelet

1 cupful of stewed tomato.
2 tablespoonful of cooked rice.
4 eggs.
4 t.s. pepper, paprika.

Mix the tomato, rice, seasoning, separate the whites of eggs from the yolks, beating both separately, but thoroughly. When the whites are beaten until stiff and dry gently fold into the yolks, but do not mix too thoroughly. Pour into a hot greased pan, then pour in the tomato and fold over like a plain omelet. Serve very hot.

A cheese omelet can be made the same way, sprinkling on tablespoonful of grated cheese over the omelet when in the pan. In fact, almost any left-over vegetables or other foods can be added—like asparagus tips, cold, chopped chicken or other chopped meat, cooked oysters, sardines, sausage, etc.

SUICIDE WAS A TORONTO MAN

TORONTO April 24.—The Alien registrar reported today that Karol Sawich, who figured in the suicide pact in Montreal, resided at 69 Spadina Ave. this city, previous to July 23rd, when he applied for and received permission to go to Montreal. He has not reported since. Sawich came to Toronto from St. Catherine's in 1917 and was an Austrian by birth. He was single and about 21 years of age.

LONDON, April 24.—This city took an all day holiday and went wild with unrestrained joy, mingled with pathos, to welcome western Ontario's own, first in number, of Canada's fighting battalions, and first in the hearts of western Ontario people. The battalion detained more than one thousand strong at the Grand Trunk station and escorted by the spirits of hundreds of honored comrades and 200 returned members of the regiment and various total forces, marched through streets to the armories where a public reception was held. There were short speeches by Mayor Somerville and others followed, by a banquet. The men returned to their barracks this afternoon in time to permit out of town men to leave for home on evening trains.
