New Statesman and Nation declared the King's stand "is a tribute to the honesty and straightforwardness of the King's character".

Dec. 4th. Daily Mail - favouring a compromise, said there was a growing sentiment in the House of Commons favouring giving the monarch "all the time he desires" to come to a decision.

Des. 4th, Daily Harald - "It is imporative Frime Minister Baldwin should shoulder the distastoful task of telling the people why the Cabinet and dominions do oppose the marriage".

Dec. 4th, News Chronicle - There unquestionably is a strong and growing desire smong the public that the King should marry the woman of his choice as soon as she is free to marry him, but that she should not become the queen of England."

Lee. 4th, Baily Express - "This thing can be brought to a close whenever Mr. Haldwin and his Government desire - by withdrawing their opposition to the King's intention of marrying. We cannot afford to lose the King. We cannot let him give up the Throne".

Dec. 4th, C.P. Dispatch. London crowds cheer for King, signing Mattonal Anthem, "For Ho's a Jolly Good Fellow", etc. Shouts and cheers for King, such as "After South Hales you cannot let him down"; "Edward is right, Baldwin is wrong".

Dec. 5th, A.F. Dispatch - "Chanting crowds rosmed london today, shouting themselves hearse in praise of King Edward, from Mayfair to Cheapside - "Edward is right, Baldwin is wrong?".

CABINET

Dec. 4th - London Times - said the marriage "would scandalize a very large proportion of the mation and Empire, and therefore do infinite harm to the whole institution of the British monarchy.

Dec. 4th - (Citizen) - Mr. Baldwin's statement to House of Commons: "His Majosty's Government are not prepared to introduce such legislation". (That is, to allow King to marry without wife becoming Queen). Statement greated by thunderous applause. Labor leader made no statement.

Dec. 4th - (C.P. Dispatch) - Observers said: "While national affection and sympathy for the King have been evident throughout, marked confidence in the Prime Minister has been manifested from all parts of the House. ... Hormal reaction from unanimity on big occasions has revealed a Labor minority willing to contamplate the proposed marriage. A split also exists in the Opposition Liberal ranks, while a Conservative minority is definitely opposed to abdication.

Nec. 4th - Sir Archibeld Sinclair, Parliamentary Liberal leader said: "Mr. Baldwin declared in the House of Commons this afternoon that such a course (i.e. giving the wife of the Hing status other than that of Queen) was impossible, and in that declaretion he was supported cortainly by applause - and I think by general feeling - of the House.

Dec. 4th - Ernest Bevan, President of the Trades Union Congress, said "We cannot forget the supremacy of Parliament.
