KING AND LAND BILL. His essage to a Caucus of Irish Land-

lords. Chicago, July 13.—A London des-

patch to the Inter Ocean says:-"I regard the passage of this bill, in a shape acceptable to the representatives of the Irish tenants, as an act of patriotic duty," was the message King Edward sent to the caucus of Irish landlord peers through the Duke of Abercorn at a critical time.

The King had been informed that, after a prolonged session, that caucus had decided to resist the proposals

had decided to resist the proposals which the Irish Nationalists had insisted upon as essential, and he despatched the Duke post-haste with his virtual command.

The caucus decision was immediately, reversed, and the bill was saved. It is safe now, unless the House of Lords, influenced by the Irish landlord peers, should whittle down the concessions obtained by the Irish party from Chief Secretary Wyndham in the committees. The opinion of the Irish leaders, as expressed to-day, is that the act's utility will depend mainly upon its administration. It is elastic in its provisions, and if liberally administered will be a final settlement.

The Irish party is anxious to get it through the House of Lords before the King visits Ireland, as his influence has been exercised from the first in making the landlord party agree the concessions to the tenants.

CRUSADE AGAINST TRAMPS.

Railway Police Made Three Arrests in This City. Toronto, July 13.—Owing to the prevalence of crime in the country districts, and as a direct result of the murder of Glory Whalen at Collingwood, the Provincial detectives have inaugurated a crusade against tramps. Provincial Detecagainst tramps. Provincial Detective Joseph Rogers has been given charge of the work, and he has enlisted the help of the railway constables in carrying ou this plans. It is proposed to have an officer visit every town and village along the lines of the railways, with a view to placing under arrest any persons who have no visible means of support.
