International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow—David's Confession.—Ps. 51.
Golden Text—"Create in me a clean heart, O God."

David's fall came from his unclean heart. This warrior king, ever victorious over his enemies, had a traitor within him, a besetting sin, and, yielding to the flesh in the hour of temptation he was grievously—primarily against God, but also against man and his own soul. To understand this lesson one must read II Samuel, 11 and 12. After months of dissembling he has to face his conscience. God rebukes him through Nathan, and this Psalm was composed and chanted as a public confession to God, the priests and Israel, of his sin and repentance. He had brought up the Sacred Ark containing the commandments written on tables of stone, but God had not yet written them in his heart, and he must learn his need.

First, David covets his neighbor's wife—when he has several of his own—and yields to instead of quenching his desire; then he breaks the 7th and 8th commandments, and to hide his shame, breaks the 6th, murdering by proxy his faithful soldier Uriah.

Being born sinners, conceived in sin, is the loathsome heredity of all our race, but by the grace of God, Jesus Christ, the Son of God, tasteth death for every man—"Where sin abounds grace much more abundantly, abounds." Forgiveness is not enough; our hearts must be re-created clean, by the Spirit and Word of God and through the blood of Jesus, and walking in the light we have fellowship with God, not otherwise; without His cleansing presence and power if we look we covet, we lust, and in His sight to covet is to steal, to hate is to kill. The priests can use the little, feathery hisop shrub to sprinkle the sacrificial blood, and water of cleansing, but the internal work God must do for the penitent king. No doubt, David restored would be used of God to save others, and that God has used this Psalm to restore, cleanse, and console can testify. Heart purity is God's will for us,—"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God."
