COUNTY OF HALTON.

The County of Halton is bounded on the North by the County of Wellington, on the South by Lake Ontario, on the East by the County of Peel, and on the West by the County of Wentworth.

By the census returns of 1851-2 the County of Halton contained a population of eighteen thousand three hundred and twenty-two, embracing the following nationalities: of England and Wales 1930, of Scotland 1538, of Ireland 3438, natives of Canada 9767, natives of Canada of French origin 818, United States 673, and of other countries 158. The census returns of 1861 give the population at 22,794: native of England and Wales 2142, of Scotland 1820, of Ireland 3102, natives of Canada 14694, natives of Canada of French origin 55, United States 701, and of other countries 280. From the same returns (1861) we find the county contained 1877 occupiers of land, holding in acres 203,727, of which 131,109 acres were under cultivation, 83,739 under crops, 44,988 under pasture.2,482 under gardens and orchards,73,518 under wood and wild land. The entire cash value of farms \$8,245,080, cash value of farming implements \$278,947, produce of gardens, orchards, &c., \$41, The number of acres under wheat 33,774, producing 601,993 bushels. The total value of live stock was \$929.180.
