Washington, June 18—The production of anthracite surpassed all expectations in 1913, exceeding the highest previous output by nearly 1,000,000 tons, according to figures compiled by the United States Geological Survey. Including the coal recovered from old clum banks and a small quantity dredged from Susquehanna River, the production for the year was \$1,718,680 long tons, valued at \$195,181,127, compared with 75,322,855 tons, valued at \$176,622,626 for 1912.
