Ordered, that Mr. Partelow carry the said Bill to the Council and desire their concurrence thereto.

On motion of Mr. Taylor.—Whereas it is expedient that the House should be informed as to the yearly income of the College previous to the Endowment thereof:

Therefore Resolved, that an humble address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to direct an account of the present annual income of the College, derived from rents of Lands, interest of money, or from any other source, to be laid before the House.

sent the Address.
