Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair,

The Attorney General Chairman of the Committee reported, That they had gone through the Bill and agreed to the same. Ordered, that the said Bill receive the third reading.

Ordered, That the said Bill do pass,

and be engrossed.

The Attorney General gave notice that he would bring in a Bill to enable the Justices of the Peace of King's County and Prince County to commit criminals to the Gaol of Charlotte-Town.

On Motion the House resolved itself

into a Committee of the whole House, to resume the consideration of the Bill intituled "an Act to prevent the running at large of Boar Pigs,"

Mr. Speaker left the Chair,

Mr. Mabey took the Chair of the Committee,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair,

Mr. Mabey Chairman of the Committee reported, That they had made a progress in the Bill, and that he was directed to move that they may have leave to sit again. Ordered accordingly.

Adjourned to 10 o'clock to-morrow.

Mr. M'Gregor moved for leave to bring in a Bill to regulate the Fisheries of the Island, and for protecting property embarked in the same," which on Motion received the first reading.

Mr. M'Gregor gave notice that he would on an early day, bring in a Bill to to prevent non-resident Pedlars and Traders from reading their Wares, without first obtaining a Licence for that purpose.

By Order, Mr. Campbell carried to his Majesty's Council, the Bill intituled "an Act for the relief of Michael Burke, an Insolvent Debtor," for their concurrence.

On Motion of Dr. M'Aulay, it was ordered, That an Address be presented to his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that his Excellency would be pleased to order the proper officer to lay before this House, the original Warrant Book, and the Accounts of the respective Collectors of Impost, and having presented the following Address to the House, it was agreed to, viz.

"To His Excellency Colonel JOHN READY, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief, in and over His Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor and Vice Admiral of the same, &c. &c. &c.

delay as possible, that the Session may not be unnecessarily prolonged, has made an application for a copy of the Warrant Book to the Clerk of his Majesty's Council, and was led to expect that the same should be furnished on this day, but by a communication made by that officer to the Clerk of this Honse, it now finds that several days may elapse before they are put into its possession.

"This House has therefore humbly to request that your Excellency will be pleased to order the original Warrant Book before it, to enable it to enter into a complete examination of the Public Accounts, that his Majesty's subjects in this Colony may be satisfied how the Public Money has been disposed of, that all cause of discontent may as far as possible

"The House also takes this opportunity of requesting that your Excellency will be pleased to order the Accounts of the different Collectors of Impost and Excise to be laid before it as early as possible.
