News in Brief
Helsinki, Finland, April 12.—The
Finnish Landtag opened today for the
first time since the war broke out, amid
manifestations of Russo-Finnish fraterni-

guarantee against future violations of
Finland's liberties.

substantial majority (21) over the next
one on the list.

SARDINES GO UP IN PRICE
Eastport, Me., April 16.—And now the
bumble bees are humming, managiding
under the name of sardine, to contribute
its bit to the high cost of living. On the
opening of the canning season, today, the
packers are experiencing considerable
difficulty in obtaining enough workmen
to complete their sardines. It is estimated
that one hundred men are wanted to
maintain the sardine line, but only twenty
men have been secured in two weeks of
campaigning for recruits, in which Major
General Wilson, G. O. C. has taken a
prominent part, and there is no hope
of raising a battalion, or even a company
of sardines.
