## FIRE IN ASYLUM IN HAMILTON

Blaze of Mysterious Origin Broke Out Very Early Yesterday.

### ALL PATIENTS WERE SAVED

Nurses and Attendants Did Noble Work in Removing Them.

Hamilton, April 24.—A mysterious fire which started about 12:30 o'clock Sunday morning in the men's wing of the Orchard House at the asylum caused damage variously estimated at between \$35,000 and \$50,000. Dr. W. M. English, the superintendent of the hospital, claims that the fire was caused by defective wiring between the third floor and garret of the building, but Provincial Inspector Rogers was unable to tell where the fire started. There were 183 patients in this wing of the building when the flames were discovered by Supervisor Stewart, and everyone was taken out. In addition over 100 patients were removed from the rest of the Orchard House to the main building. The fire started while the night watchman was off duty and when discovered had gained considerable headway. When the Hamilton fire brigade had scaled the mountain the third floor and attic was a mass of flames and Chief Ten Eyck bent all efforts to saving the rest of the building and rescuing the patients. In this he was successful and the fire was under control by 4 o'clock this morning. Dr. English denied a report that the fire was the result of an accident, occurring at a dinner held by attendants to celebrate St. Julien Day, and said that he knew of no such celebration. On Friday last week a fire occurred in a box just outside the laundry of the Orchard House building, but was discovered in time to prevent serious damage. The fire was thought to have been the work of an incendiary, but Dr. English claimed that it was caused by spontaneous combustion. The nurses and attendants at the hospital were commended by Assistant Provincial Secretary Armstrong, Inspector Rogers and Provincial Architect Heakes for having transferred all the patients without loss of life or limb. There will not be a public enquiry, but Supt. English will institute a private enquiry to make sure that the fire was not due to carelessness or incendiarism.

## CANADIAN WOMEN FLOCK TO ENGLAND

Relatives of Soldiers Go to Old Country to be Near the Boys in Khaki.

London, April 24.—Nearly 1,500 widows, wives and children of Canadian soldiers at the front have been brought to England in the last few months. Many came here to be near their husbands and because living is cheaper than in Canada. Still others came to work in munition factories.

### Better Than Taxation.

London, April 24.—Prohibition of the importation of the plumage and skins of wild birds was urged upon the government as better than taxation in a resolution passed by the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds. The society asked the government to prohibit entirely the importation of wild birds' plumage—ostrich feathers and excepted only for "useless and undesirable import and a wholly indefensible form of extravagance."

London, April 25.—Augustine Birrell, chief secretary for Ireland, announced in the House of Commons today that grave disturbances broke out in Dublin yesterday. He added that troops had been sent to the Irish capital and that the situation was not well in hand.

Mr. Birrell said that twelve persons had been killed before the disturbances were quelled.

Mr. Birrell made his announcement in reply to a question by Commons Craig immediately after the assembling of the House. He said that the post office had been forcibly taken possession of and that telegraphic communication had been cut.

In the course of the day, however, Mr. Birrell said soldiers arrived from The Curragh and the situation was well in hand, although as communications were quelled.

## QUATIA CAMP RAIDED AND DESTROYED

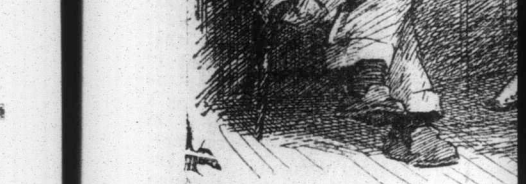
Eight British Aeroplanes Attack Enemy in Egypt Near the Canal.
