A Large Vote Polled on Monday.

On Monday the election resulted in the return of the former Council, Mr. Wm. Jones, the fifth candidate being nted by a small margin.

The By-Law to adopt "The Public Parks Act," was carried by a majority of 112, an expression of opinion by the ratepayers which will strengthen the hands of the Board of Manager when appointed.

Other Elections and By-Laws

In the civic elections at Toronto, Mr. Emerson Coatsworth was elected Mayor beating Mr. F. S. Spence by a majority of 4,007. The license reduction by-laws were defeated by substantial majorities.

Bobcaygeon unanimously carried the by-law for \$25,000 to purchase the M Boyd Company's water-power and establish an electric light plant by the

At Campbellford a by-law to dispense with the waterworks and electric light commission was carried two to one. This places the waterworks and electric light directly under the control of the

Lakefield—The local option by-law was carried by a majority of 41.

Peterborough carried the by-law \$25,000 for better fire protection, by a small majority. The reduction of license plebiscite was carried by a large majority.

Local option by-laws in the townships of Dummer and Otonabee were carried by good majorities, thus cutting off the hotels at Keene, Warsaw and Mo-Cracken's Landing.

At Norwoed the by-law fixing the assessment of Finlay & Son's new concrete factory, was carried almost unanimously, only three voting against
