## WHEAT IS NOW MOVING FREELY

### C.P.R. Furnishes Cars For North Line—Market Is Glutted With Feed Wheat Says Mr. Snow

Wheat is moving rapidly on the Soo line and heavy shipments are being made daily. The north line is suffering the West yesterday by Mr. Snow, who reports the movement fairly steady. There has been a lot of high grade wheat delivered at that point, as well as at Dundurn, Davidson, Hanley, and points on the C.N.R. main line. The territory suffering the worst this season is on the C.P.R. main line from Regina east and on the Arto line, where the situation is somewhat serious in places. Mr. Snow has been growing wheat since 1880 and this is the worst crop he has ever handled. He says that grainmen paid too much for low grade wheat early in the season and they have much of it yet on their hands. They are loaded up with it at Fort William and there is no market. He does not know what will be done with the bulk of feed wheat not disposed of. There is a nominal market for it, but that amounts to practically only a quotation for no buyer can realise on this class of grain after getting it on his hands. The fact of the matter is, said Mr. Snow, the market is glutted with low grades.

ed the crown by Jerry Collins, who acted as D.R.O. in this election. He had been promised a reward for certain illegal acts in connection with the election, he said, and when he had gone after it, had been politely told to go to. This was his revenge. Collins' original charge was that he had been given \$1000 to bribe voters, and that O'Gorman had instructed him in the art of ballot manipulation. After O'Gorman had appeared in the Toronto police court, warrants were issued as a result of evidence given, for George Reid, who is one of London's most prominent citizens; Daniel Wiley, a customs officer; William J. Malloy, hotelkeeper; George Ardy, butcher, William Serviss, carpenter, and Ed. I. Sifton, manufacturer. Sifton got away to Buffalo, but returned during the trial just concluded for use as a crown witness. The charges against Ardy and Serviss were not pressed. After a preliminary hearing before Magistrate Denison, the defendants were bound over for trial at the assizes next. Postponements were secured up to the fall assizes. During the interval strong efforts were made to have the prosecution called off, but the attorney general's department was insistent that the men should be given a fair trial. For reasons best known to themselves, the defence unexpectedly then decided to exercise their prerogative and go before the royal judge, but no sooner was this allowed than objections were raised to the jurisdiction held by Judge Winchester in the matter. This will be one of the grounds on which appeal will be taken to the higher courts.

Toronto, Nov. 30.—Quite as sudden and startling as was the inception of the now famous London election trial came the verdict yesterday of "guilty." All over Canada the trial had aroused attention. In Ontario, from one end of which to the other, the "Liberal Machine" of inglorious memory is alleged to have at one time or another operated, the evidence was of exceptional interest. The prosecution was inaugurated in September of last year, when John O'Gorman, commission merchant of Toronto, was arrested on a charge of bribery in the federal by-election in London in June, 1905, when Hon. ## ARTHUR NEILD GETS FIVE YEAR SENTENCE

### Regina Mail Clerk on North Line Made an Example of by the Court—Wife Will Go To England

Prince Albert Dec. 2.—Today Mr. Justice Prendergast sentenced Arthur Neild to five years in the Edmonton penitentiary, the prisoner having pleaded guilty some days ago to the charges of stealing money from the mails on the north line where he was a mail clerk, and made admissions on twenty-one counts. Mrs. Neild, wife of the prisoner has been here for a few weeks and has seen her husband frequently. She has made arrangements to go to her home in England, but was waiting till he was sentenced. His friends are disappointed that he got the five years as the minimum penalty is three. Arthur Neild entered the railway mail service about the middle of October 1906 and was less than a year in that position. He was getting along well with the civil service examinations, but his salary was small. He was only getting \$400 a year and mileage which in all amounted to about \$50 a month. From time to time the department had complaints along the line that mail was going astray, but notwithstanding that secret service men were sent out from time to time, they could not find out where the leak was. ## Combine Existed

### Edmonton, Nov. 30.—The lumber combine case was concluded on Thursday and His Honor Chief Justice Sifton, found the defendant W. H. Clark of Edmonton, guilty on one count in the indictment and imposed a fine of \$500. There were twelve counts in the indictment and the one of which Clark was adjudged guilty was that of unduly preventing or lessening the purchase, manufacture, sale or exerting undue influence of the price of lumber. ## FIELDING'S LINES BROKEN

### Great Victory in Nova Scotia For Mr. Borden—A Clean Election

Halifax, Nov. 28.—John Stanfield carried the Conservative flag to victory in Colchester county today, and pierced the solid 18 phalanx, who have since 1904, supported Hon. W. S. Fielding through thick and thin. Stanfield's majority over his opponent, Charles Hill, is over 350, overcoming an adverse Liberal majority of 191 secured by the late member, now Judge Lawrence. In giving to R. L. Borden a supporter in the first county opened in Nova Scotia since the Halifax platform was announced, it is regarded throughout Nova Scotia as showing the electors' unqualified approval of the progressive features of the opposition policy. Stanfield reiterated throughout the campaign his unqualified acceptance of Mr. Borden's platform. The fight was most spectacular. Fielding hastily left Ottawa to aid his nominee and the country swarmed with Liberal members, both local and federal. Stanfield had also the assistance of the best stumpers the party can boast of, prominent among them being George W. Fowler, Geo. E. Foster, F. W. Manright, and R. H. Butts, the latter two being brilliant speakers and prospective candi-
