She Sent Bullet Through her Heart Because Her Lover Was False.

Report of the Revolver Heard by Guests at the Wedding Three Blocks Away.

New York, July 6 .- Just at the hour that the ceremony took place which united to another the man who had promised to marry her, Sophia Sarie, a beautiful Finnish woman 32 years old, stood at the corner of One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street and Park avles, tuine, canvas, lustres, cheviots and enue last evening, and placing the muzzle of a revolver to her breast, sent a bullet through heer heart. The pistol shot which ended the life of the heartbroken girl was distinctly heard in an apartment three blocks distant, where Miss Sarie's faithless the bridegroom, his happy bride and the thirty or more guests at the wed-ding assembled in the apartment had no idea of the significance of the re-

> The story of the tragedy in the dife of the girl suicide was made known late last night, when Mrs, Katie Michaelson, of No. 2,092 Madison avenue, called at the East One Hundred and Tenty-sixth street station and identified the body of the dead girl as that of her sister, Sophia Sarie, a governess, who lived at No. 1,413 East One Hundred and Thirty-Second street. Between sobs and hysterical outbursts of grief Mrs. Michaelson told the story of her sister's life.

> Until a few weeks ago her sister, she said, had been employed as a governess. When she gave up her posi-tion it was with the understanding, Mrs. Michaelson said, that she was to be soon married to August Newholm, whom she had met about six months go at a church reception.

"I have been working on her wed-ding clothes," sobbed Mrs. Michaelson, She had noticed three weeks ago that. Newholm was acting coolly toward her, and when she reproached him he became angry.
"She found out that the reason New-

holm was acting coldly toward her was that he was going with a girl named Victorine Lindhorst, who lived at No. 6 East One Hundred and Thirty-third street. Only a day or two ago she heard that he was engaged to Miss Lindhorst and was going to marry her. decided to commit suicide.'

Ma jor Stouch has apprised the war de 2.000 Indians took part in the dance last week in celebration of their religious festival, and the tortures were to have closed the doings. This is the first time that the dance of the Cheyennes have been stopped by the gov ernment authorities.

#### BAD APPLE PACKING.

inspectors for Manitoba and the Northweest Territories, reporting to the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, states that after visiting nearly all the towns which are fruit dis-tributing centres between Winnipeg and the Rocky Mounains, he finds everywhere great dissatisfaction from losses attending the handling of On-tario apples.
