Township Councils.

Camden Council.

Council met Tuesday September 3rd as a court of revision on Huff drain and for general business. Members all present. The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted, accounts and communications read, the following accounts passed:—William Houston for culvert on River road, Con. 14, Gore, \$35.00; Alonso Ruble, extra work and material culvert, on Base Line, \$3.50; Mayhew & Harmer sewer pipe, \$8.74; Norman Sterling, sheep killed by dogs, \$4.00; W. H. Wilson, medicine for indigents, \$3.45; W. M. Bird, work on Drummond's creek bridge, \$10.00.

William Bedford applied for culvert over Hague Drain referred to commissioner Paul.

John Hawkins applied for culvert over Hawkins—Mason drain referred to commissioner Brown.

Patrick Smythe complained of water lying on Johnston road referred to commissioner Paul.

John Kennedy complained that Manson Award drain was out of repair referred to commissioner Elgie.

Reeve and commissioner Brown were appointed a committee to investigate a proposal to change the river road in lot 2 concession 7 Gore and report at next meeting.

Commissioner Brown was instructed to proceed at once and repair Base Line road along Traxler Base Line drain.

John Dickson applied for tile for 6 and 7 side road concession 1 referred to Commissioner Stewart.

The Clerk was instructed to prepare a by-law to commute John Kennedy's statute labor for a term of two years, said Kennedy to construct a ditch along sixth concession lot opposite lot 10 to enter Parslow drain to satisfaction of commissioner Elgie.

A report made by W. G. McGeorge on the repair of the Danforth drain in the Township of Chatham and served on the Reeve of Camden by Chatham Township Council was read and adopted.

As report made by A. S. Code on the repair of the Harper Drain in the township of Zone and served on Reeve of Camden by the township of Zone was read and adopted.

School section No. 5 Camden, applied to the Council for the sum of \$255 to be raised by debenture for the purpose of improvements on school house. The Clerk was instructed to prepare a by-law for the issue of said debentures.

At two o'clock in afternoon the court of revision on Huff Drain, sat with Reeve in the chair.

Evidence of appellants and defendants was taken and the court made the following changes.

That \$3.00 be taken from n/e 1/4 lot 7 con 4; that \$11.00 be taken from n/e 1/4 lot 7 con 5; that \$1.00 be taken from n/e 1/4 lot 10 con 4; that \$2.40 be added to n/e 1/4 lot 9 con 4; that \$3.00 be added to n/e 1/4 lot 9 con 5; that \$3.00 be added to n/e 1/4 lot 9 con 5; that \$2.25 be added to n/e 1/4 lot 10 con 5; that \$1.40 be added to n/e 1/4 lot 10 con 5; and the Engineer's assessment as amended, was confirmed and the court closed.

The council adjourned to meet at the call of the Reeve.

A regular meeting of the Municipal Council of the township of Harwich was held in the Township Hall on Monday Sep. 9th at 10 a. m. Members all present. The minutes of meeting of Aug. 12th were read and adopted.

Following communications were read:—Wilson, Kerr & Pike, re Union Drain Report; Sec. Provincial Parks, re Rondeau Park Road; Mrs. W. Wilcox with account for keep of W. Slann—laid over; A. P. Stephens and S. H. Knight in regard to Statute Labor; Angus Smith C. E. with an amended report on Union Drain; John Vester giving notice of date of meeting of County Committee at Blain's Creek re Bridge; W. G. McGeorge C. E. with declaration re work on Middle Level & Tap Outlet Drain and also with plans for bridge over McGregor's Creek known as Reynolds's Bridge; Adam Henry re damages.

A petition was presented by James McMillan and others asking for a new bridge over the river road at what is known as Shepley's creek.

A statement and account was received from T. R. Coogan for expenses in connection with a lunatic Walters.

Moved by Young—Buchanan—That as complaint has been made regarding the L. E. & D. R. crossing over the river road, that the Clerk request the engineer of said railway, O. McKay, C. E., to meet the commissioner of 1st ward at Chatham at some early and convenient date. Carried.

McCormick—Young—That the report of Engineer McGeorge for the building of a steel pile bridge over McGregor's creek, be adopted and that the Clerk ask for tenders. Carried.

Morrison—McCormick—That in regard to the complaint of John A. McNaughton re Wolfe Creek drain, that the Reeve meet Mr. McNaughton at the solicitor's office and find the proper procedure and form of application for repair of said drain, upon which the Reeve have the power to act, and proceed with such repair as advised by the solicitor, and place the matter in the hands of the engineer. Carried.

Young—McCormick—That the resolution passed on August 12 by the council adopting the report of the engineer on the Union Drain be rescinded, and his amended report on the same drain be adopted, and councillor Morrison make the sale of the work as soon as possible. Carried.

Buchanan—Morrison—That as William Thompson has stated to the Council that he has performed his S.
