Tenure of Office. To The Planet,-The action of the sity council in dismissing Mr. J. W. Shackleton from the position of city ngineer, has awakened considerable citizens think the council has acted hastily and unfairly and unfairly, and confidence in their ability to administer the affairs of the city economical. ly. Not a few ratepayers feel tha Mr. Shackleton should not be dismiss ed to provide a vacancy for some out-sider, wholly ignorant of the special needs of the city and the location of the sewers. It appears that Mr. Shackleton is charged with making one or two blanders of a somewhat trivial nature. Whether the charges be well grounded or not, is a question which has created some difference of which has created some difference of opinion, certainly the charges, if true, are not so serious as to justify the council in dismissing him from office. The public walks constructed under the supervision of Mr. Shackleton, have been of considerable extent, and have been of considerable extent, and importance, involving the expenditure of a large amount of money. Special mention may be made of King street pavement, costing in the neighborhood of \$23,000. Now, I understand; that the extras claimed by the contractors, for King street pavement, did not exceed \$500, and that Mir. Shackleton's estimate was within three or four hundred dollars of the actual cost. I hundred dollars of the actual cost. know of no public work in the history of our city, completed under such fa-orable circumstances, or that has met with such general approval as King

with such general approval as King street pavement.

It might be both interesting and profitable to contrast Mr. Shackleton's career as city engineer with that of his predecessor, who was not dismissed from office, but voluntarily resigned to secure a more lucrative position. During his predecessor's term of office cement walks were laid upon many streets. In some instances the proper levels were not given northeright quality of cement used, and the result, as might naturally be expected, is that in the wet season some of the walks are covered with water and many of them had to be renewed and yet his of them had to be renewed and yet his predecessor departed amid the plaudits of the council.

It is to be hoped that the council will reconsider their action in the case of Mr. Shackleton and deal with the matter fairly and impartially, and in the way best city. Yours truly.
