UNNERVED BY SIGHTS LEADER

Brutality Most Hideous Marked Attack on Jews,

Bourse Gazette Correspondent Gives Vivid Description of the Awful Facts of the Bialistok Massacre-Hospitals Are Filled With the Dead and Wounded - Bodies of the Slain Are Fearfully Mutilated.

St. Petersburg, June 19.—The embarge on news from Bialistok was lifted yesterday, and the Associated Press staff correspondent was for the first time allowed to telegraph directly from the sacked city a picture of the scene of ruin and desolation left in the wake of the mob. The Awful Facts.

Horrible details have been sent out by the correspondents of The Bourse Gazette, who arrived at Bialistok in company with Deputy Stohepkin on Saturday. The correspondent says he Saturday. The correspondent says he

was utterly unnerved by the sights he witnessed at the hospital.

"Merely saying that the corpses were mutilated," he writes, "fails to describe the awful faots. The faces of the dead have lost all human semblance, and the corpses street," of the dead have lost all human semb-lance, and the corpses simply are crushed masses of fiesh and bone soak-ing in blood. It is impossible to con-ceive of such bestiafity. The corpse of Teacher Apstein lay on the grass with the hands tied. In the face and eyes had been hammered three-inch nalls.

"Rioters entered his house and, after bestial outrages, killed him thus and then murdered the rest of his family of seven. When the corpse arrived at the hospital it was also marked with

at the hospital it was also marked with bayonet thrusts.

"Beside the body of Apstein lay the corpse of a child of ten years, whose leg had been chopped off with an axe. Here also were the dead from the Schlachter home, where, according to witnesses, soldiers came and plundered the house and killed the wife, son and a neighbor's daughter and seriously wounded Schlachter and his two daughters.

The windows and doors of the Jewish houses were wide open, giving a view of their wrecked interiors, or were boarded up with the rude wooden shutters. Everywhere could be seen weeping women hunting for traces of killed or wounded relatives. The principal stores either were devastated wrecks or mere mounds of nahes, among which the wretched proprietors, lest week rich, but now reduced to poverty, were wandering about weakly, endesvoring to ascertain the extent of their misfortunes.

In the Heepfale.


The scene at the Jewish Heepfal, where the majority of the Jewish dead and most severely wounded were taken, was indescribably sickening. The grass plot outside the hospital was covered with mutilated and mangied corpses, arranged in two long rows. The wooden walk from the gate to the door, over which the bodies were carried, was stained with blood, and cobbiestone pavement and roadway was spattered with gree.

The dead and wounded are still arriving. Many of them had been lying untouched in the streets for two or three days. The bodies of some of the severely wounded were frightfully bruised, broken and mangled.

The hospital attendants asserted that about 100 in all had been brought in and that many more remained outside Bialistok, where it was unsafe for Red Cross detachments to venture.

At the district hospital there were six dead persons and eight or ten wounded. These were all Christians. These bodies were not mangled as were those of the Jews, whose hands, arms and legs were sometim ped off from mere wantonness.
