Miss Eva Hunter is still visiting in Washington, D. C.

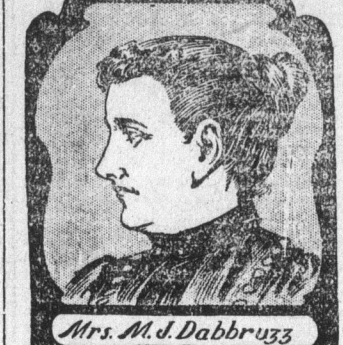

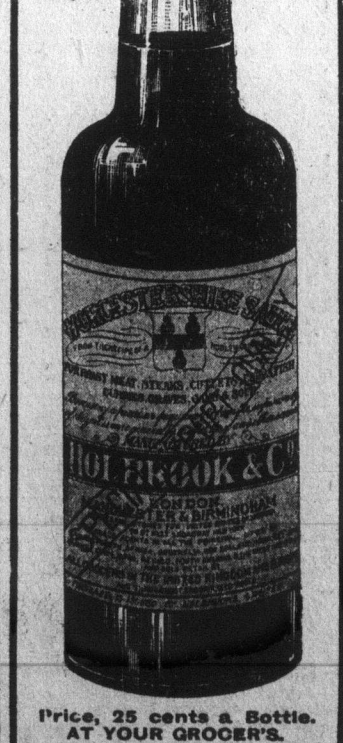
Her husband attended the furnace and did other chores. They were an English couple, past middle age, and had been here about a year.

Local Improvement Notice.

NOTICE is hereby given that the City Council of Chatham intend to pass a By-law or By-laws under the provisions of the Municipal Act and of the City's By-law respecting local improvements and special assessments therefor for the levying of special (and the temporary loans obtained therefor) of works mentioned in the first column of Schedule "A" below; and the total cost of the respective works is shown in the second column, and the portion thereof assessed by the city and to be paid out of the general funds is shown in the third column of said schedule, and the difference between the total cost and the portion assessed by the City represents the amount to be raised by special assessment.

And that a statement showing the lands liable to assessment for the cost of the respective works aforesaid and the names of the owners thereof as far as they can be ascertained from the last revised assessment roll, and a measurement of the frontages of such lands and of the lands exempt from taxation, is now filed in the office of the clerk of said City and is open for inspection during office hours.

And that a Court of Revision will be held on MONDAY, the 12th day of February, 1906, at the City Council Chamber, in Harrison Hall, in the City of Chatham, at 10 o'clock a.m., for the purpose of hearing complaints and appeals against the proposed assessments or accuracy of the frontage measurement, or any complaint which persons interested may desire to make and which is by law cognizable by the Court.

Any party desiring to complain or appeal to the Court of Revision shall within the time required by law, give to and leave with the Clerk of the City a written notice of such complaint or appeal, specifying the grounds therefor.
