



TO BROTHER WORKMEN

Premier of Russia, Count Witte, Issues an Appeal.

"Do Not Listen to Bad Advice"-"Get to Work" He Pleads, As One "Who Sympathizes With You and Wishes You Well"-Rumor and Military Dictatorship Caused a Panic-Burned 255 Houses.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 17.-Wednesday a meeting of the Ministers at Count Witte's residence decided to make a personal appeal to the workmen, and personal appeal to the workmen, and dfafted the following, which was sent yesterday to all the factories, mills and other works, and passed throughout the industrial section:

(Daylow Western Cot to work

Brother Workmen.-Get to work. Cease making disturbances and have pity on your wives and children. Do not listen to bad advice. The Emperor has ordered us to devote special attention to the labor question. For this purpose he has created a Ministry of Trade and Commerce, which must especially seek to establish just relations between workmen and employers. Have patience. All that is possible will be done for you. Listen to the advice of a man who sympathizes with you and wishes you well."
When the above appeal was read to

the workmen at the Westinghouse works the leaders replied:

Rumor Caused Panic A panic prevailed on the Bourse yes-terday as the result of a rumor that the Grand Duke Nicholas Nicholaievitch commander of the Imperial Guard, had been appointed military dic-tator. There was a stampede of hold-ers of industrial stocks, who hastened unload. Government lotteries fell 25 points to 400, and Imperial fours dropped to 831-2, a lower point than touched at any time during the war. M. Voouich, chief of Premier Witte's chancellery, authorized the Associated Press to deny positively the rumor that a dictator had been appointed. He also declared that it had not been decided to declare martial law in St. Petersburger

Tartar villages were stormed by Armenians a few days ago. Many Tartars were killed and their bodies horribly mutilated. The Armenians burned 255 houses and drove off all the stock belonging to the Tartars.

Washington, Nov. 17.—Spencer Eddy, U. S. charge d'affaires at St. Peters. burg, cabled yesterday that pardons have been granted to the Cronstadi mutineers, except six, who were shot yesterday. Mr. Eddy adds that the giving of Imperial lands and action on giving of Imperial lands and action on the Cronstadt mutineers may do much oward stopping trouble.

Killed by Bursting Fly Wheel. Winnipeg, Nov. 17 .- H. Landes, age electrical foreman in the C. P. R shops here, was killed yesterday after noon. He was starting a stationary engine and by some mischance set the engine in operation before adjusting he governor balls. The engine immed iately attained a high velocity with the result that the fly wheel burst. A section struck the foreman, killing him instantly.
