The following letter was received by Mrs. Geo. L. Colwell concerning the death of her son Ralph:

No 3 Canadian C. C. S.
May 19, 1916

My Dear Mrs. Colwell:

I was called down to the hospital early this morning to see your son who had just come in so badly wounded in the body. He was conscious, but not suffering. I saw there was no hope for him, and I think he knew it, too. I prayed with him, and he could just whisper the Lord's prayer, and gave me your address, sending his love. Half an hour later, after seeing other patients, I came back and he was just passing, so quietly, into Paradise. The nurse and I were with him as the end came—such a brave, good boy. I thought you would like a letter telling you of this, and I know how happily he died. He will be laid to rest in our cemetery here and his personal kit will be sent to you. Miss Hare, the matron here, is from St. John, and sends her warm sympathy.

It is a sad lot you mothers have these days, but you will be very proud of this dear boy of yours.

Death of Pte. James O. Dickinson

The death took place at the Fisher Memorial hospital, Woodstock, on June 1 of Pte. James O. Dickinson of Hartland, after an illness of over six months of pneumonia—in fact, ever since his enlistment in D Co. 104th Batt. Pte. Dickinson was 30 years of age and leaves three brothers, Frank of the 140th, Harry of Hartland and Ernest of Smyrna, Me., and two sisters, Mrs. McQuarrie of Waterville, Me., and Mrs. Geo. Stevens of Smyrna. Pte. Dickinson was a favorite among those who knew him best and his taking away will be keenly felt by a large circle of friends, all of whom extend heartfelt sympathy to the bereaved ones.

The deceased was given a military funeral by his regiment, interment taking place at Wakefield, Rev. George Kincaid of the United Baptist church here attending to the religious ceremonies.

Simms-Baltitude

A very pretty but quiet wedding took place at Bath Wednesday afternoon, when J. R. H. Simms, the well known barrister of that place was united in marriage to Mrs. Beatrice B. Baltitude recently of London, England, who has been in Canada since September last.

The ceremony was performed by Rev. G. A. Ross, pastor of the

Methodist church, in the presence of a number of near relatives of the groom at his residence. The bride was very prettily gowned in gray silk with hat to match. After lunching the happy couple left by the 4.25 express for a short tour of the southern part of the province.

B., where he has very successfully practised his profession for the past fourteen years, and has at times been engaged in politics, being a candidate for the House of Assembly in 1905. Orser, assisted by Revs. G. A. and Earl Giberson of Bath and Bristol, the funeral being held at the home of the deceased. The text for the occasion was Isaiah 38, verse 7: "Set thine house in order." The burial was at the beautiful cemetery at Wicklow, known as the Gallupe cemetery. There we consigned the remains of our long time friend and neighbor.

A select choir presided over that part of the service, selected by Mrs. Parker, some of them her immediate neighbors, who rendered their parts very satisfactorily. One of her neighbors, Miss Estabrook, presided at the organ. Mrs. Parker has the prayers and sympathy of the community in this her great bereavement, and we would further add that this is one of the times of her life as a Christian believer to summon the help and consolation of Him who ever cares for His afflicted children. 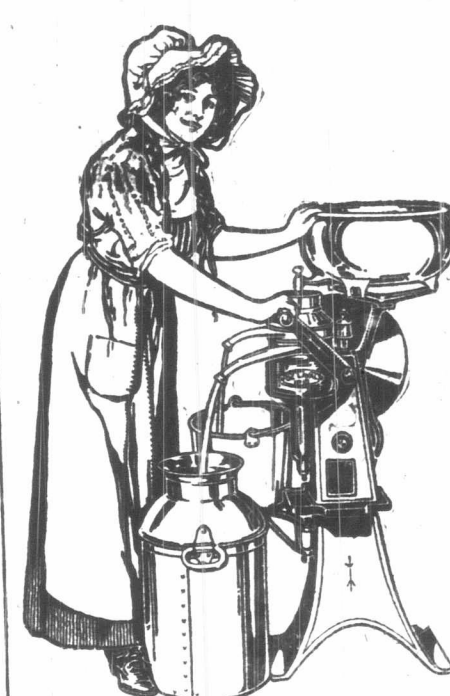
