A special meeting of the Town Council was held in the Council Chamber last evening for the purpose of receiving reports, bills, etc., which were left over from the last regular meeting.

In the absence of His Worship Mayor Keiley, Alderman McLeod on motion took the chair. The town clerk's report showed \$4,800 collected during the year, with a bank balance of \$1500.
