THE GRIDIRON.

U. N. B. and B. and B. Should Play a deciding Game of Football.

Citizens, particularly those specially interested in football, have been anticipating the announcement of a game which would be certain to attract much attention and interest and would draw a large crowd of spectators. This is a game between the U. N. B. and B. and B. fifteen. The U. N. B. has made a record for itself this season unequalled by any previous team from the college that ever stepped upon the gridiron.
