**The Tipping System in Poland
Has Developed Into Nuisance
According to Late Travellers**

Boatman Who Rows People Across the River in Summer Now
Collects His Dole From Those Who Walk
Across Upon the Ice.

Warsaw, March 4.—The tipping sys-
tem, always strong in Poland, has
attained dimensions which make it a
nuisance, inasmuch as it necessitates
carrying about huge rolls of paper
money. One is expected to hand over
a wad of this money to the postman
when he brings a letter, to the man
in the lift who carries one up or
down, the porter who opens the door
at night, the attendant who, unso-
licited, helps one on or off with one's
hat or hands out a towel or opens a
door. In fact, everyone who has any

thing to do in a mental capacity has
to have his tip. Of all these, the
house porter is the greatest annoy-
ance, as he shuts the hall door or
outer gate every night at 10 o'clock
and has to be bribed to open it.
This week I went to a cinema in
Nevy Slot, the principal street here,
and on coming out I found that the
porter's wife had shut the gate and
was collecting money from persons
who, like myself, were leaving the
show. Thus is one charged not only
for entering a car, but for getting
out of it as well.

The Poles, who hate above all to
be accused of niggardliness, show the
most remarkable docility in paying
these exactions. A few weeks ago I
started walking across the Vistula on
the ice but a man rushed after me,
demanding money, for he was a boat-
man. When the river is free of ice
he rows people across, near the
broken Poniatowski bridge, which was
blown up in 1915 by the retreating
Russians. Although he cannot row
people across in winter, he exacts his
fee just the same—and all who walk
across give him his indemnity with-
out a murmur.

Of course the waiters in restaurants
look for tips, though in 1918, when
Polish freedom was restored, they re-
volted against this system, insisting
that 10 per cent. be added to the bill
instead. Every guest, therefore, pays
this tip, whether he likes to do so or
not. But, in addition, he is expected
to leave on the table another tip of
the same amount, supposed to go to
the "bus boy," who hands the patron
his bill at the end of the meal.
Sometimes he forgets to produce the
light, but never does he fail to grab
the tip.

**U. S. HOSTESSES TO
KING AND QUEEN**
Countess of Granard and Duch-
ess of Roxburghe Are Both
American Girls.

London, March 4.—Since their re-

the King and Queen have been pre-

first was the Countess of Granard,
daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ogden Mills,
and the other the Duchess of Rox-
burghe, who was Miss May Golet.

The Earl of Granard recently was
appointed master of the horse, and
both the Granards and the Roxburghe
are highly esteemed by the British
sovereigns. The seat of the Duke is
Floors Castle, Scotland, one of the
finest north of the Tweed. The dinner
attended by the King and Queen was
given at the Roxburghe town residence
at No. 41 Carlton House Terrace, which
contains many old masterpieces and
is one of the most sumptuous houses
in London.

Rome, March 3.—A large quantity

praising the crew of the Dixmude
and some visiting cards. It is thought
probable the entire wreck of the Dix-
mude is lying off San Marco.
