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Dignitary of Church Becomes Alarmed Over Dancing Mania

Montreal Churchman, Discussing Conditions There, Says There is a Time When Dancing Becomes a Sin—Too Much of a Good Thing is Bad.

(Montreal Herald.)

A certain very high dignitary of the church, who for reasons expressed to a representative of The Herald did not wish to reveal his identity, declares that the dancing mania among young people had reached extraordinary and alarming proportions and that the clergy were encountering some difficulty in combating the danger.

"I fear that the dancing mania is very difficult to prescribe a cure. Personally I think the only way is to endeavor to teach our young people that too much of a good thing is quite as bad as too little; in other words, to teach the moderation. This applies to dancing, which in itself is not wrong, but if not carried too far. With regard to the unfortunate attendant practices among the young, these, however, to be separated from dancing, because they are very dangerous and easily lead to excesses of an unthinkable nature. The difficulty, however, is to separate them from dancing, however, mothers and fathers take a strong stand on these matters with their children. I have no doubt but what they will eventually disappear as adjuncts of our social intercourse.

Not in Montreal Schools.

A canvass of the Protestant public schools revealed the fact that up to the present, little complaint if any had been heard about excessive dancing among the children and young people in attendance. As one individual expressed it connected with the management of these schools, "We are in a measure beyond such a craze. Our schools are the public schools and that of which we are a part is going to school for and do not allow external interests to deflect them from their duties as pupils. If the teachers were to object to dancing in this regard it has not yet been expressed."

Disappears With \$2,500 of Finances

Mysterious Case of Private Detective Who Cannot Be Traced by Michigan Widow.

Ottawa, Feb. 17.—With honorable memory, which has been granted by the Canadian and United States forces to his credit, and holding a position as chief investigator of a private detective agency in Toronto, James A. Perry, said to be the son of a 93-year-old contractor in Hull or Ottawa, came here from the United States on the afternoon of the 14th inst. He was carrying with him a large sum of money divided by his father among a number of children. With him he carried some \$2,500, which he had received in connection with his father's business. He was accompanied here by his fiancée, a trained nurse of Grand Rapids, Mich. Within a short time he wrote for more money. His fiancée had received \$1,500 from him. She had to have returned to Grand Rapids a week ago last Thursday or Friday and to have been married on Saturday.

The U. S. Whiskey Station Scheme

To Establish Distribution Points to Curb Profiteering Druggists and Others.

New York, Feb. 17.—After a conference today with a representative committee of Brooklyn physicians, United States Attorney Ross announced that he had taken the first step toward establishment of a Government distributing station for the release of whiskey on prescriptions from physicians. He has during the last few weeks received many complaints from the public, said Mr. Ross, "from newspapers and from physicians in the district in which large numbers of the druggists in the eastern district of New York and presumably with other sections of the city are being supplied with dispensing whiskey for medicinal purposes.

Call Landlords to Rent Hearing

Boston, Feb. 17.—Thirty-two landlords, most of them from Boston, were yesterday requested to appear before a public hearing tomorrow afternoon relative to the proposed rent stabilization law in Boston. The hearing will begin at 2 p. m.

The commission seeks information as to rent increases and tenants with specific complaints will be heard at the hearing. The landlords have been requested to come prepared with information relative to the propriety of their control and the rents charged. One of the landlords, Myer Dana, has been before the commission previously as a result of charges made by his tenants.
