Cataract Company Replies to Mayor's Inquiries.

#### Rumor of Power Arrangement In Toronto.

Mayor Stewart to-day received a re ply to the letter he sent to General Manager Hawkins asking a number of technical questions in explanation of the company's offer to supply the city with power at \$16 per horse-power. Mayor declared that when these questions were answered the city would know just how much the Cataract power would cost them.

Mr. Hawkins' answers have been to Engineer Sothman, of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission, to be interpreted. One point in Mr. Hawkins letter that differs very much from the Hydro offer, the officials say, regards the monthly maximum basis. The Cataract says it will not make a contract on that basis. The disadvantage of a yearly maximum, the officials point out, is that in December the maximum would be higher than in any other month but be higher than in any other month, but the city would have to pay on that basis for the year.

Dear Sir,—Replying to your favor of the 4th inst. asking for further information upon our offer to supply power to the city corporation for the operation of its waterworks pumps and the street lighting system, I beg to say as follows:

1. The power offered is to be measured on the basis of volt amperes. 2 Seven hundred and forty-six amperes constituting an electrical horse

power.

3. We should stipulate that the power
