Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a fam-ily, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in per-son at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency of the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 50 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sis-ter. In certain conditions a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead status) and cultivate fifty acres, extra. A homesteader who has exhausted the homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$10.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

FAILURES LAST WEEK

Oct. 16.—Commercial failures this week in the United States, as reported by R. G. Dun & Co., are 242 against 192 last week, 236 the preceding week and 229 the corresponding week last year. Failures in Canada number 30 against 32 last week, 28 the preceding week and 27 last year. Of failures this week in the United States 96 were in the East, 57 South, 89 West and 20 in the Pacific States, and 74 report liabilities of \$5,000 or more against 68 last week. Liabilities of commercial failures reported thus far for October are \$4,605,321 against \$5,632,672 for the same period last year.

BRADSTREET'S TRADE REVIEW

Montreal reports to Bradstreet's say the week has seen little change in general conditions there. Toronto reports say all lines of trade here continue active. Winnipeg reports say all lines of business continue to move freely. Vancouver and Victoria reports say the outlook for business continues excellent all along the coast. Quebec reports to Bradstreet's continue fairly satisfactory. Hamilton reports say business there is of good volume and steady in character. London reports say business there continues steady in tone. Ottawa reports say a good normal business is moving in all lines of trade. COBALT STOCKS. Cobalt's continued firm on the Toronto exchange on Saturday, although there was no marked movement in any particular issue. A little Crown Reserve came out, but the stock did not show much variation, selling between 5.90 and 5.99. La Rose made a further advance, recovering at 6.85, the highest point it has touched since the break. Kerr Lake also moved up on the announcement of its increased dividend, going to 9.05, with a good demand. Nipissing sold a little easier around 11.57. Silver Bar was the most active of the minor issues, the stock selling freely around 21. Trethewey was firm, going up to 1.49. Peterson Lake was easier around 25.1-2, and Leaf sold around 16.1-2. Chambers-Ferland and City of Cobalt sold up to 51.
