PETERBORO, Ont., May 22.—Jas forman, who shot and killed hi other on Friday night while under the influence of liquor, and while in the act of being arrested by the local police, came up for a preliminary hearing on Saturday morning. The trial was adjourned until next Thursday at 10 a.m.

He held his place on the top of the C. P. R. bridge where he fled from the police after commtting the shooting at seven o'clock until 1.30 on Saturday morning. Armed with a rifle and pistol, he promenaded the top-most girder of the bridge, defying the police. He kept the immens crowd that gathered out of curiosity at a respectable distance, by firing an occasional warning shot, part of the time he was singing, and exchanging chat with the crowd.

Several times he scattered the crowd by giving them time while he counted ten to make themselves scarce, evidently enjoyed the excited scuttle of the crowd, when he fired at random. Two priests were called and tried to induce him to come down but he refused till half-nast one, when he came down, gave himself up to the police and was driven to the Police

Petrified Lord Will Now be Buried

ASHEVILLE, N.C., May 20 .- After staying unclaimed for 7 years in embalmed solitude, arrayed in full evening dress with silk hat and cane, the nummified body of Sydney Lascelles, alias "Lord Douglas," alias "Lord Beresford," alias "Charles J. Asquith" is on its way to Washington, D. C. consigned to Dr. McPherson Critchon, presumably to be buried in the crestory there. The body was claime by a Mrs. J. T. Summerfield, of Passaic. N. J., who said that she was the sister-in-law of Lascelles' first wife. now living in Baltimore. She made affidavit to that effect and by her order the mummy was shipped to Washington.

The departure of the "Petrified Lord," whose body has twice been identified as that of Sidney Lascelles, noted forger, swindler and bigamist, writes finis to a tale of crime and deception in high life which opened in Australia, shifted to the ranks of nobility in England and closed in a cheap lodging house in this city.

He was lionized in London afte securing an introduction to the American Ambassador under the name o Beresford posing as a cadet of the powerful English house of that name In America the highest circles of society did homage to the bogus Lord At Rome, Ga., Fitzgerald, Ga., Norfolk. Va., and other cities wherever he went, Lascelles formed matrimonial alliances with the daughters of the rich, only to leave them in the course of a week, poorer in purse, but richer in experience. He was convicted at Rome, Galveston, of promoting fraudulent schemes, and sentenced to vears hard labor. He served his term. He came to Asheville from Norfolk. Va., eight years ago, suffering from tuberculosis, and died in 1903.

In Death Grasp.

Lakeville, Mass., May 22.- Locked in the frenzied hold of John J. Gallagher, a Boston telegrapher, whom he had carried to the surface, Adam Bopp, a Middlesboro shoemaker, was who died from the result of the son's drowned with Gallagher in his work of shooting at St. Joseph's Hospital at rescue to-day, when he was unable to free himself from the "Death grasp" of the man he tried to save.
