Episcopal Dispensation

The following Episcopal Dispensation was promulgated in the Anglican churches of the city during Divine service yesterday:—

"I desire to intimate to the clergy and laity of the Diocese that inasmuch as the Coronation festivities are likely to be held in the city of St. John's and other places not only upon Thursday, June 22nd, the day of the Coronation, but also upon Friday, the 23rd, which in the Prayer Book is ordered to be observed as a day of fasting or abstinence, and is also the Eve or Vigil before St. John the Baptist Day—so far as any power of the kind is vested in me, in virtue of my office as Bishop of the Diocese, I hereby relieve the members of the Church in the Diocese from any obligation which such order imposes upon them, so that they may share in the festivities appointed for Friday, the 23rd, without considering that they are thereby infringing the rules of the Church." **LEWELLYN NEWFOUNDLAND.**

Boys Almost Drowned.

Yesterday morning also a boy fell out of a boat at the King's Wharf and might have drowned had not other lads been there to rescue him.

Matins having been sung at the Church of England Cathedral yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, the Ordination Service was conducted by His Lordship Bishop Jones at 11 o'clock. The candidates for the Priesthood were Rev. F. L. Law, from Canada, Rev. H. Facey, Smith's Sound, T. B., Rev. G. Templeton, Tack's Beach, T.B., Rev. A. Shorter, of Harbor Buffett, Rev. W. R. Courage, Pushthrough. The "Processional" hymn was "The Church's One Foundation." The clergymen who participated in the ceremonies were Rev. Canon Temple, Rev. Canon White, Revs. Bolt, Barton, Godden and Bell. The sermon was preached by the Rev. Canon Temple who spoke from the text: "I heard the voice of the Lord saying whom shall I send and who will go for us; then said I, Here am I, send me." In the Imposition of hands the Bishop was assisted by the clergymen present. Holy Communion was administered at the close.

Dogs Kill Poultry.

It is very discouraging to people who are trying to raise an improved and expensive stock of poultry to find some fine morning on going to their "henery" that the birds have been all destroyed by the dogs. The Poultry Association will do well to discuss the question of doing away with those savage dogs before talking or writing any more on raising poultry. Hon. George Knowling has been made the latest victim of the devastating canines that frequent the South Side and Waterford Bridge Road. A savage pack entered his poultry yard at "Silverdale" last night and destroyed about 20 of his prize stock poultry, which had been raised during the past season.

St. Bon's Win Shield.

St. Bon's easily defeated their opponents by 7 wickets and 41 runs and thereby wins the Shield this season. Ellis, who committed suicide in Harvey Park. He was a man of refinement and, according to his own story, had once possessed considerable wealth, which he lost through speculation. He claimed that he was once associated with the Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain in one of his campaigns, and that he was intimate with the former Premier of Great Britain.

The Hobble Hip

Is the Latest Peril

London, May 29.—Now comes the "Hobble hip" to take its place in medical dictionaries. According to a London physician wearers of the hobble skirt little realize the bodily dangers which may come from encasing their hips in these limb-fettered dresses.

Only recently, he said, a young woman complained to him that after a day's shopping she felt herself suffering from a kind of semi-paralysis in her hips and legs—a feeling like that experienced when one has allowed her feet to "go to sleep."

"I discovered that she was a wearer of a hobble skirt," said the physician, "and a 'hobble hip' was the natural outcome. If women only knew that ninety per cent. of their illness have been due to tight lacing they would not incur further risks by tight skirting."

Maria Montessori Rediscovered

The Ten Fingers.

(Josephine Tozier, in McClure's Magazine, New York.)

At the very root of Maria Montessori's method lies what may be called the rediscovery of the ten fingers. Put on the track by Seguin, who realized that the sense of touch, the basis of all the other senses, was the great interpreter of vision and guide to accuracy of perception. It was at the same time the earliest developed of our faculties and the first to be dulled if left uncultivated. She found that the finger-tips of young children are almost unbelievably sensitive, but that, in the absence of careful training, they begin to lose this sensitiveness after the age of 6. The first step in her method, then, is to teach children to "see with their fingers," and thus to cultivate a delicately sensitive muscular memory. Not only is this a desirable end in itself, but it has the further advantage of minimizing the strain placed by ordinary methods of education upon the eyes, and consequently upon the brain. By the cultivation of the sense of touch, reflex actions are set up in inferior nerve centres with which the brain has little or no concern. One of Maria Montessori's chief objections to some of the most popular kindergarten employments is that they involve a harmful effort of the organs most closely associated with the brain—the eyes.

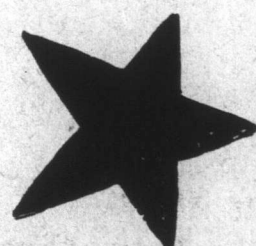
