How Captain Rostron Will Use Money Raised by New York Paper For Him.

New York, June 3.—On the deck of his ship this morning at eleven o'clock, in the presence of all the officers and crew of the Carpathia, a cheque representing \$10,000 in gold was handed to Captain Arthur H. Rostron, brave rescuer of the Titanic's 705 survivors. The purse, which had been contributed solely by the readers of the New York American, was handed to the Carpathia's captain by one of that paper's editors.

When told of the gift, the bronzed cheeks of Captain Rostron flushed and his blue eyes were perceptibly blurred as he said:

"I am not ashamed to say to you and to say to everybody, that I appreciate this gift you tell me about. I appreciate it not only because it is an expression of gratitude, but also because I have three fine boys back in England whom I can now educate properly and give them a good start in the world. I appreciate it also because it means relieving my mother of the anxieties every good mother feels whose husband is not a rich man."
